OLD BUSINESS:

Approval of Minutes: Councilmember Buehler moved to approve the regular meeting minutes of July 6, 2017, as presented. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Audience Participation: Mayor Smith called for audience participation and there was none. **Presentation**

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:

Treasurer's Report for Quarter Ending June 30, 2017: Councilmember Pawlowski moved to approve the Treasurer's Report for the quarter ending June 30, 2017 as presented. Councilmember Garvey seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Approval of Engineering Agreement for City Project 17-04: Wastewater Master Plan Project #1: Mayor Smith stated I'm going to let Tony speak on any discussion the Council might have. Go ahead Tony.

- Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell stated I'm here to answer any questions you might have about the project.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked the old guys from PEC have all retired haven't they.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied they have, but the lead engineer for this project was on board when we were wrapping up the treatment facility.

Councilmember Brungardt moved to approve the scope and fee from PEC in an amount not to exceed \$87,000.00 for design engineering services for City Project 17-04. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Executive Session – Personnel Matters of Non-Elected Personnel: Councilmember Buehler moved to recess into executive session to discuss an employee's performance pursuant to the non-elected personnel matter exception, K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1) for 15 minutes, beginning at 7:03 p.m. and returning to the Council Chambers at 7:18p.m. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Pawlowski moved to return to open session at 7:18 p.m. Councilmember Studnicka seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Studnicka moved to authorize the Mayor to sign an amendment to the City Administrator's Contract and provide for a financial incentive based on the results of the performance evaluation. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

REPORTS:

Department Heads: Public Works Director Jeff Rupp briefed the Council on the status of the Mill and Overlay project, Ida Street Drainage Project, the Third and Kay stormwater project which is out for advertisement, and the DeSoto Road Bridge welding project. There is some erosion on asphalt on the side of the bridge and Jeff is working to get some rip rap placed in those areas that will get the City through until the next phase of the DeSoto Road Project. He also provided an update for the acquisition of the easements for the DeSoto Road Project and advised that the final plans are moving along as projected for the Eisenhower Road Project.

Governing Body: Councilmember Pawlowski mentioned that she read an article that the County is wanting to require the owners of Grinter Farms to place portable toilets on their property since the draw from all over the state to their property has been so significant. ORDINANCE NO. 981

AN ORDINANCE INCORPORATING THE STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE BY REFERENCE

An ordinance regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas; incorporating by reference the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 45th Edition of 2017, with certain omissions, changes and additions; prescribing additional regulations; providing certain penalties and repealing Ordinance No. 969 and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the Governing Body of the City of Lansing, Kansas:

SECTION 1.

15-101, INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE.

There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 45th Edition of 2017, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. One official copy of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 981," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours. The police department, municipal judge and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of office copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked as may be deemed expedient.

15-102. OMISSIONS, CHANGES, ADDITIONS AND DELETIONS TO THE STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CITIES

Article 1: Section 1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance, relating to definitions, is hereby amended to add as follows:

Motorized Mini Bikes. Any motorized mini bike not more than 51 inches in length, 14 inches in width and 30 inches in height, by the manufacturer's specifications which may be propelled by either gasoline or electric power and having a seat designed to be straddled by the operator, except a motorized bicycle and electric-assisted bicycle.

(All other definitions not modified, deleted or changed shall remain in effect.)

Article 4: Section 17 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Display of Unauthorized Signs, Signals or Markings.

- (a) No person shall place, maintain or display upon or in view of any highway any unauthorized sign, signal, marking or device which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles an official traffic-control device or railroad sign or signal, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic, or which hides from view or interferes with the effectiveness of any official traffic-control device or any railroad sign or signal.
- (b) No person shall place or maintain nor shall any public authority permit upon any highway any official traffic control device bearing thereon any commercial advertising, except for business signs included as part of official motorist service panels or roadside area information panels approved by the secretary of transportation.
- (c) This section shall not be deemed to prohibit the erection upon private property adjacent to highways of signs giving useful directional information and of a type that cannot be mistaken for official signs.
- (d) Every such prohibited sign, signal, or marking is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the governing body is hereby empowered to remove the same or cause it to be removed without notice.
- (e) Traffic regulations on Private Property. Whenever the person in possession or control of any private property used by the public for purposes of vehicular traffic by permission of the owner shall cause to be posted at each entrance thereto a permanently lettered clearly legible sign with the following legend:

"TRAFFIC REGULATIONS OF THE CITY OF LANSING ENFORCED ON THIS PROPERTY. SPEED LIMIT 10 MPH." (OR AS POSTED.)

then such private property shall thereafter be deemed to be under the traffic regulations of the city as provided by law.

Article 7: Section 33 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Maximum Speed Limits.

(a) Except as provided in subsection (b) and except when a special hazard exists that requires lower speed for compliance with K.S.A. 8-1557, and amendments thereto, the limits specified in this subsection or established as hereinafter authorized by law shall be maximum

lawful speeds, and no person shall operate a vehicle at a speed in excess of such maximum limits:

- (1) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any business district;
- (2) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any park;
- (3) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any posted school zone or any public thoroughfare on or across which children pass going to and from school during school days, including the following locations and times:

Ida Street	from Brookridge Street to 416 Ida Street	
Bittersweet Street	from West Mary Street to Ida Street	7:45 a.m. to 8:45 a.m.
West Mary Street	from 200 ft west of Bittersweet Street to 200 ft east of West Kay Street	3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.
West Kay Street	from West Mary Street to J Street	
South 2 nd Street	from East Mary Street to East Olive Street	7:30 a.m. to 8:30 a.m.
East Olive Street	from 206 East Olive Street to South 2 nd Street	3:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m.

(4) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any residential district and on other streets within the city, if said limits were set prior to 1994. All speed limits set after 1994 shall be 30 miles an hour in any residential district or other streets within the city except where modified by engineering and traffic investigation as provided hereafter in subsection (c) of this section.

The maximum speed limit established by or pursuant to this paragraph shall be of force and effect regardless of whether signs are posted giving notice thereof, and, notwithstanding any signs giving notice of minimum speed limit in excess of the limits established by or pursuant to this paragraph, shall not be of any force or effect, subject to the following exception.

Whenever the Public Works Director shall determine upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that any speed limit herein set forth is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist, the Public Works Director shall determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit consistent with applicable state and local statutes which shall be effective at all times or during daytime or nighttime or at such other times as may be determined when appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected pursuant to Governing Body action and K.S.A. 8-1560 and 8-2002.

(b) No person shall drive a school bus to or from school, or interschool or intraschool functions or activities, at a speed greater than 45 miles per hour on any roadway having dirt,

sand or gravel surface, and in no event shall a school bus be driven to and from school or activities in excess of 55 miles per hour, notwithstanding any maximum speed limit in excess thereof. The provisions of this subsection shall also apply to buses used for the transportation of students enrolled in community junior colleges or area vocational schools, when such buses are transporting students to or from school functions or activities.

(c) Speed limits on certain streets within the City of Lansing. The Governing Body, having determined upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that the speed limit permitted under state law and Section 33 of the "Standard Traffic Ordinance" is greater or less than is reasonable under the conditions found to exist within the city, hereby determines and declares that the reasonable and safe speed limit on the portion of the streets is as listed below. The Public Works Director is hereby directed to cause to have erected appropriate signs giving notice of such speed limit along the streets maintained by the city.

Article 14: Section 114.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of All-Terrain Vehicle

- A. Except as provided in subsection (b), (d), (e), and (f), it shall be unlawful for any person to operate an all-terrain vehicle:
 - 1. on any interstate highway, federal highway or state highway; or
 - 2. on any city street, alley, public parking lot, right-of-way or upon property owned by the City of Lansing.
- B. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such all-terrain vehicles may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.
- C. No all-terrain vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street or road between sunset and sunrise unless equipped with lights as required by law for motorcycles.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.
- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance their duties.
- F. Any person operating an all-terrain vehicle pursuant to (b), (d), (e) and (f) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,100)

Article 14: Section 114.2 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of a Micro Utility Truck.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a micro utility truck:
 - 1. On any interstate highway, federal highway, or state highway; or
 - 2. Within the corporate limits of any city unless authorized by such city.
- B. No micro utility truck may be operated on any public highway, street, or road unless such vehicle complies with the equipment requirements under the provisions of Article 17 of Chapter 8 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated and amendments thereto.
- C. The provisions of subsection (a), shall not prohibit a micro utility truck from crossing a federal or state highway.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or micro utility trucks owned and operated by persons contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such micro utility trucks may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.
- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or micro utility trucks owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.
- F. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance their duties.
- G. Any person operating a micro utility truck pursuant to (d), (e) and (f) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,106)

Article 14: Sec. 114.5 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of a Work-Site Utility Vehicle.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a work-site utility vehicle:
 - 1. On any interstate highway, federal highway, or state highway; or
 - 2. Within the corporate limits of any city unless authorized by such city.

- B. No work-site utility vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, or road between sunset and sunrise unless equipped with lights as required by law for motorcycles.
- C. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such work-site utility vehicles may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.
- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of their duties.
- F. Any person operating a work-site utility vehicle pursuant to (c), (d) and (e) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,109)

Article 14: Sec. 114.6 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby added to read as follows:

<u>Unlawful Operation of a Motorized Mini Bike.</u> It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, or for the owner to permit the operation of, a motorized mini bike upon a street, highway, public parking lot, or property owned by the City of Lansing.

Article 14: Section 126.3 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby added to read as follows:

Littering.

(a) No person shall throw, place or drop litter or allow litter to be thrown, placed or dropped from a motor vehicle onto or upon any highway, road or street. The driver of the vehicle may be cited for any litter thrown, placed or dropped from the motor vehicle, unless any other person in the motor vehicle admits to or is identified as having committed the act.

- (b) "Litter" means rubbish, refuse, waste material, garbage, trash or debris of whatever kind or description and includes improperly discarded paper, metal, plastic or glass.
- (c) This section shall be part of and supplemental to the uniform act regulating traffic on highways. (K.S.A. 8-15,102)

Article 17: Section 181.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby added to read as follows:

One-way glass and sun screening devices on vehicles registered out of state; requirements, exceptions; penalties.

- (a) No motor vehicle which is required to be registered in another state and which is operated on the streets and highways of the City of Lansing shall be equipped with one-way glass or any sun screening device, as defined in Section 1, used in conjunction with windshields, side wings, front side windows, the side windows behind the driver, and/or rear windows that do not meet the following requirements:
 - (1) A sun screening device when used in conjunction with the windshield shall be nonreflective and shall not be red, yellow or amber in color. A sun screening device shall be used only along the top of the windshield and shall not extend downward beyond the AS1 line which is clearly defined and marked;
 - (2) a sun screening device when used in conjunction with the side wing or side windows located at the immediate right and left of the driver, the side windows immediately behind the driver and the rear most window shall be nonreflective; and
 - (3) the total light transmission shall not be less than 19% when a sun screening device is used in conjunction with other existing sun screening devices
- (b) Subsection (a)(3) shall not apply to a window of a law enforcement motor vehicle that is clearly identified as such by words or other symbols on the outside of the vehicle.
- (c) This section shall not prohibit labels, stickers or other informational signs that are required or permitted by state law.
- (d) Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of traffic offense and shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$500.

Article 19: Section 194 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Driving While License Canceled, Suspended or Revoked; Penalty.

- (a) 1. Any person who drives a motor vehicle on any street or highway at a time when such person's privilege so to do is canceled, suspended or revoked or while such person's privilege to obtain a driver's license is suspended or revoked pursuant to K.S.A. 8-252a and amendments thereto, shall upon a first conviction be punished by imprisonment for not more than six months or fined not to exceed \$1,000, or both such fine and imprisonment. On a second conviction of a violation of this section such person shall be punished by imprisonment for not more than one year or fined not to exceed \$2,500, or both such fine and imprisonment.
 - 2. No person shall be convicted under this section if such person was entitled at the time of arrest under K.S.A. 8-257 and amendments thereto, to the return of such person's driver's license.
 - 3. Except as otherwise provided by subsection (a)(4), every person convicted under this section shall be sentenced to at least five days' imprisonment and fined at least \$100 and upon a second conviction shall not be eligible for parole until completion of five days' imprisonment.

4. If a person:

- A. is convicted of a violation of this section, committed while the person's privilege to drive or privilege to obtain a driver's license was suspended or revoked for a violation of K.S.A. 8-2,144 or K.S.A. 8-1567, and amendments thereto, or any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or a law of another state, which ordinance or resolution or law prohibits the acts prohibited by those statutes; and
- B. is or has been also convicted of a violation of K.S.A. 8-2,144 or K.S.A. 8-1567, and amendments thereto, or any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or law of another state, which ordinance or resolution or law prohibits the acts prohibited by those statutes, committed while the person's privilege to drive or privilege to obtain a driver's license was so suspended or revoked, the person shall not be eligible for suspension of sentence, probation or parole until the person has served at least 90 days' imprisonment, and any fine imposed on such person shall be in addition to such a term of imprisonment..
- (b) For the purposes of determining whether a conviction is a first or second conviction in sentencing under this section, conviction includes a conviction of a violation of any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or a law of any state which is in substantial conformity with this section. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-262)

Article 19: Section 195.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance relating to Operation of a Motor Vehicle When a Habitual Violator is hereby declared to be and is omitted and deleted.

15-103. TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS AND TRAFFIC OFFENSES

- A. An ordinance traffic infraction is a violation of any section of this ordinance that prescribes or requires the same behavior as that prescribed or required by a statutory provision that is classified as a traffic infraction in K.S.A. 8-2118.
- B. All traffic violations which are included within this ordinance and which are not ordinance traffic infractions, as defined in subsection (a) of this section, shall be considered traffic offenses.

15-104. PENALTIES

(See Article 20: Section 201 of the Standard Traffic Ordinances)

SECTION 2.

REPEAL. Ordinance No. 969, and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

Staff has informed each resident interested in setting up a payment plan that the account will be submitted to a third party collection agency if the resident misses a payment.

This Ordinance will be distributed in final form at the August 3, 2017 city council meeting to allow for receipt of payments through 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 3, 2017.

ORDINANCE NO. 983

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING ASSESSMENTS FOR UNPAID CHARGES AGAINST EACH LOT & PARCEL OF GROUND AS A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT TO CONSTITUTE A LIEN UPON THE PROPERTY FOR THE AMOUNT OF DELINQUENT FEES FOR SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL & SEWER ASSESSMENT OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS.

WHEREAS, section 16-116 and 16-209 (e) of the City of Lansing, Kansas, Code of Ordinances require the Finance Department to compile a list of all customers who are at least two (2) months delinquent on their solid waste Disposal and sewer services bills; and the Governing Body shall, by ordinance, levy and assess the charges and/or penalties against each lot or parcel of ground served as a special assessment.

WHEREAS, said Governing Body of the City of Lansing, Kansas, has determined that the cost for said services rendered be levied and assessed against each lot or parcel of ground for the unpaid charges as a special assessment, which shall constitute a lien upon the property for the amount of said delinquent fees.

WHEREAS, the assessment shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as ordinary county ad valorem property taxes, subject to the same penalties and procedures provided for such taxes, and all laws applicable to the collection, levy and enforcement of county ad valorem property taxes.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Special assessments to pay the cost, including late fees and accrued interest, of the solid waste collection and waste water collection, and treatment, of the City of Lansing, Kansas, be and the same are hereby levied against the several lots, pieces, and parcels of land liable for such special assessments as a result of their failure to pay the unpaid charges as delinquent fees, as follows, such lands being in the City of Lansing, Leavenworth County, Kansas:

SUBJECT: Application to Rezone Lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development

Background: Greenamyre Rentals, Inc., represented by Jeremy Greenamyre, has applied for a rezone of its property at Lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development, located at the intersection of Fairlane Street and Santa Fe Drive. The applicant is requesting to rezone from B-3-P Commercial Business Planned District to R-4 Multi-Family Residential. The property will remain within the Main Street Overlay District (MSOD). The property is currently vacant. If rezoned to R-4, the maximum density allowed is twelve (12) units per acre. The 1.29 acre parcel could be allowed approximately fifteen (15) multi-family units pursuant to allowed density. Since the property will remain in the MSOD, at the time of development, the property owner will submit a site plan for review and approval under the MSOD requirements.

The commercial zoned property has been on the real estate market for years and the owner has stated he feels it is a better fit for multi-family. The property does not have complete visibility from Main Street/K-7, which limits the types of commercial that could be developed on this site. Twenty-four (24) multi-family residential units (two apartment buildings with 12 units each) exist across the street (to the east) of the subject property on Santa Fe Street. The apartments are zoned Light Industrial (I-1), but they are solely a residential use.

The 2014 Lansing Comprehensive Plan: The future land use map indicates the subject property should be commercial. That said, multi-family is in existence in the neighborhood, and if this property is zoned multi-family, it would be within walking distance of stores, restaurants, and services located along Main Street in this neighborhood. The neighborhood is mixed with commercial, residential, and light industrial. During its deliberation on July 19, 2017, the Commission noted that the Comprehensive Plan would need to be amended in the future to reflect the change to multi-family residential for this parcel.

Neighborhood: At the time of this agenda memo, one commercial property owner within 200 feet contacted the department regarding the notice. The property owner had questions of staff and felt that the rezone would not affect his business. No public comments were made during the public hearing on July 19, 2017.

Planning Commission Recommendation: The Planning Commission held a public hearing on July 19, 2017, and in a 6-0 vote, with one Commissioner absent, the Commission unanimously recommended to the City Council to approve the rezone request.

Lansing Planning Commission Regular Meeting July 19, 2017

<u>Call to Order</u> — The regular monthly meeting of the Lansing Planning Commission was called to order at 7:01 p.m. by Chairman Brian Schwanz. Other members present were Vice-Chairman Ron Barry, and Commissioners Jerry Gies, Frank Reyes, Kirsten Moreland, and Mike Suozzo. Commissioner Chad Neidig was unable to attend. Chairman Schwanz noted there was a quorum present.

<u>Approval of Minutes, June 21, 2017, Regular Meeting</u> – Commissioner Gies made a motion to approve the minutes of the June 21, 2017, regular meeting, seconded by Commissioner Suozzo. The motion was approved, with Commissioner Reyes abstaining.

Old Business - none

New Business – Public Hearing – Rezone Application – Lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development. Chairman Schwanz noted that a rezoning application for lot 2, Fairlane
Commercial Development, Lansing, Kansas, requesting this parcel be rezoned from B-3-P,
Commercial Business Planned Overlay District and Main Street Overlay District, to R-4, MultiFamily Residential and Main Street Overlay District, has been submitted by Jeremy Greenamyre
for Greenamyre Rentals, Inc., property owner. He stated the property is generally located at
the northwest corner of Santa Fe Drive and Fairlane Street, Lansing, Kansas.

Chairman Schwanz opened the public hearing at 7:04 p.m. Since there was no one in the audience who wished to speak, he closed the public hearing at 7:05 p.m. and noted this starts the 14-day protest period.

At this time, Chairman Schwanz asked Community and Economic Development Director Stefanie Leif to give an overview of this application.

Ms. Leif pointed out this parcel on the map, as well as the surrounding properties. She stated this property is currently zoned B-3, Planned District, and the other property in this area is zoned B-3. She stated the area where the city shop sits is zoned Industrial, as well as the two apartment buildings. Ms. Leif said the primary reason for this request is that the owner has had this property on the market for a number of years as a commercial property. She stated the property does sit off of K-7, with some limited visibility, but does not sit on K-7 and does not have access from K-7, so the owner feels the market would be better for multi-family. She said that based on the current property size, which is 1.29 acres, there would be approximately 15 units that could be allowed on this site under the current zoning that is being requested, which allows 12 units per acre. She stated the apartment buildings nearby hold 24 units.

In terms of the Comprehensive Plan, Ms. Leif stated the future land use map does show this property as commercial, but as has been noted in other project areas, often whatever the current zoning is, it was left as that unless there was a reason to suggest something different.

Ms. Leif stated that as far as how this would fit as a multi-family area, the property nearby there on K-7 is the city's core commercial area and would be within easy walking distance for residents.

Lansing Planning Commission Regular Meeting July 19, 2017

Ms. Leif said she received one call from a property owner who had a business nearby this parcel who wondered how this might affect his business, but after she explained the project, he didn't seem to have any concerns. She then stated that the staff recommendation on this was to recommend approval to the City Council of this rezoning request from B-3-P to R-4. She said she would be happy to answer any questions, as would Mr. Greenamyre. Ms. Leif also stated that this property is currently and will remain in the Main Street Overlay District and because of this, any future development plans would be brought before the Planning Commission and City Council for approval.

Vice-Chairman Barry wanted to clarify that if this property is rezoned and the owner makes plans to build something there, those plans have to come before the Planning Commission and City Council to be approved and Ms. Leif stated that is correct. He then asked, if recommended for approval, could the rezoning be a mixed use, as is in the Comprehensive Plan, or is it restricted to multi-family. Ms. Leif stated at this time, except for a Planned Unit Development (PUD), we don't really have a mixed use zone in our ordinance. She stated because of the size of the site, it doesn't meet the threshold for a PUD. She also said a mixed use zone is something that will be addressed in the UDO.

Chairman Schwanz asked about the uses for the R-4 zoning category and then stated what those permitted and conditionally permitted uses are.

Vice-Chairman Barry stated he assumed, from a services standpoint, they could handle multi-family if they could handle commercial. Ms. Leif stated she sent the information to agencies and city departments, and the only question came from the Wastewater Department as to where they would be hooking up to sewer, but after checking back with Mr. Greenamyre, at this point, depending on the density, he doesn't know what the project may look like. She said no other concerns were relayed to her at this time.

Since there were no other questions or comments, Chairman Schwanz asked for a motion to recommend approval, denial, or approval with conditions to the City Council on the rezone application for lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development. Commissioner Gies made a motion to recommend approval of this zoning request and acknowledge it is a modification to the Comprehensive Plan future land use map.

Chairman Schwanz then stated he needed to first have a motion on the checklist as a finding of fact and asked Commissioner Gies to rescind his motion, which he did. Commissioner Suozzo made a motion to approve the checklist as a finding of fact for lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Gies and passed, with Vice-Chairman Barry abstaining.

Chairman Schwanz next entertained a motion to recommend approval, denial, or approval with conditions on the rezoning application for lot 2, Fairlane Commercial Development.

Commissioner Gies made the motion again, as previously stated, and it was seconded by Vice-Chairman Barry. The motion was unanimously approved. Chairman Schwanz asked and Ms. Leif stated this will go before the City Council on August 3.

The property is not located on Main Street/K-7, and it lacks complete visibility from Main Street. In staff's experience working with economic development in Lansing, commercial properties are in higher demand when they have access to K-7 or Eisenhower Road. The owner of the property knows there is a gap in housing products, particularly multi-family, and multi-family is across the street from the property. Thus, he feels the highest and best use of this parcel is for multi-family. If yes, explain:

3. Are there adequate sites for the proposed use in areas already properly zoned? Very little of Lansing zoning is multi-family. The current multi-family zoning north of the property is primarily single family dwellings that could be redeveloped as multi-family in the future. Market rate multi-family housing is currently a housing product that is in high demand with little supply in Lansing. If yes, where?
CONFORMANCE WITH COMPREHENSIVE PLAN:
1. Consistent with Development Policies? The comprehensive plan speaks to the need for diversity in the population and housing types. The goal for the location of multi-family is near retail and service nodes. The property is within walking distance to stores, restaurants, and services along Lansing's Main Street.
2. Consistent with Future Land Use Map? The future land use map for this property states commercial use. That said, single family dwellings are to the north and 24 multi-family units are to the east.
3. Are Public Facilities adequate? Yes. A site plan has not been submitted at this time, so location of utility connections would be determined at the time of Main Street Overlay District (MSOD) review and hearings.
TRAFFIC CONDITIONS:
1. Street(s) with Access to Property: The property is accessed from Fairlane Street and Santa Fe Drive. Fairlane has a traffic light at the intersection with Main Street/K-7.
2. Classification of Street(s): Arterial Collector Local X
3. Right of Way Width: Fairlane and Santa Fe are approximately 60 feet at this property.
4. Will turning movements caused by the proposed use create an undue traffic hazard? 


