Call To Order:

The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor Gene Kirby at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call:

Mayor Gene Kirby called the roll and indicated which councilmembers were in attendance.

Councilmembers Present:

OLD BUSINESS:

Approval of Minutes: Councilmember Trinkle moved to approve the regular meeting minutes of June 2, 2016, as presented. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was approved, with Councilmembers Garvey and Buehler abstaining from the vote.

NEW BUSINESS:

Audience Participation: Mayor Kirby called for audience participation and one resident came forward.

Brian Schwanz from 607 Brookwood Street stated good evening Mayor and City Councilmembers, I come before you tonight as the Chair of the Lansing Planning Commission. The reason for my comments this evening is because I want to speak briefly about the training the Planning Commission and the Board of Zoning Appeals had last week. The training was facilitated by Jim Kaup who is an attorney with the Kaup Law Firm who focuses on land use, similar to a training that you will be attending on June 30th. I wish I'd be in town that night as it's a phenomenal training and I know several of our Commission members may attend or try to attend to get additional information. Last night, the Planning Commission had a meeting and one of the items we discussed was the training, it was a consensus among the Planning Commission that we wanted to thank you for providing that training and the funding for the training. The training was truly amazing, in my 8 years on the Planning Commission and the 2 years on the Board of Zoning Appeals we never had a training, in 10 years we never had the opportunity for a training, so I want to thank you for that opportunity and I know the Planning Commission also feels the same way, it was truly a consensus; We'd like to have more. Unfortunately we were only able to get through half of the materials because we had so many questions for the facilitator. Once we got finished after 3 hours, we were all looking at each other like can we have more, can we do this again, because there is so much more information out there. I need to thank Stefanie for bringing this training forward and the facilitator forward, it was truly an amazing person that she brought forward to us. Also I would like to request the Council continue to fund training opportunities for the Commission and the Board of Zoning Appeals, I think it's truly a great opportunity and with this training it can only make Lansing a better place. With that being said in the coming months you will see some text amendments coming forward to the City Council from the Lansing Planning Commission on a few ordinances. During our training, we realized that we may have some ordinances that are in conflict with some things, we may even have an ordinance that is in conflict with Kansas case law, but we're not sure, we're reviewing it. Also there are some suggestions for the planning process, so next month we plan to have a work session to review 3 areas that we may potentially bring forward to you, so please feel free to attend our work session, but again, thank you again for providing the funds for the training, the training was truly amazing, and thank you for the opportunity to speak this evening, thank you.

Presentation

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:

Request for Special Use Permit – 110 N. Ethel Lane: Councilmember Gardner moved to approve the Special Use Permit for 110 N. Ethel Lane. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion.

- · Councilmember Gardner asked did you go over there.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman replied Officer Asmus did and he is here and I don't believe Mr. Thompson is here, the husband of the lady who made the request for the special use permit, but I do know that a neighbor is here and I believe would like to speak to the Council and his comments that he made, Officer Asmus included in the report, so it's up to you guys if you want to hear him out.
- Councilmember Buehler stated she currently has 4 dogs and 5 chickens?
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman replied 4 chickens, well it says 5 chickens but that and 4 dogs on this, on the initial application for permit.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated she did this because she got a ticket or a complaint.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman replied we got this because we received the information from the neighbor about that and we went out and checked.
- Councilmember McNeill stated but she never had a permit previously did she?
 - o Police Chief Steve Wayman replied correct, this is not a renewal.

- Councilmember Buehler stated and it came about and she's filing because of a complaint.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman responded yes.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked is there a neighbor here that wants to talk.
 - o Police Chief Steve Wayman replied there is a neighbor here I don't know if he wants to talk.
 - Lonnie Nelson from 108 Ethel Lane stated I was the one that made the initial complaint, and the reason for the complaint is they can't control the dogs that's the bottom line. They are destructive, they dig under the fence they dig up my flowers, and at one point they had the 4 chickens and 6 dogs and it just keeps growing and growing and growing.
- Councilmember Studnicka asked what about the waste from the dogs, is there a problem with that, is there a smell, do they keep it clean. I read the report that we got in our packet and it seems like we've got a yeah it's ok and we've got a well wait a minute it isn't ok, so.
 - Lonnie Nelson replied to me sir, it's not ok. They allow their dogs to be off leash, they run around the neighborhood. There's also cases where their dogs have relieved themselves into my flower bed, it wouldn't be an issue if they could control the animals and they just can't.
- Councilmember Buehler stated so there is a part in here that mentions something about animal cruelty.
 - Lonnie Nelson replied yes sir, outside when the dogs bark she strikes them with a rake and also in the front yard, one of their girls walks the dog around the neighborhood, never has a bag with her, the dogs do their business wherever they want throughout the neighborhood and if they don't when the child comes back, she whips the dog and tells them to go potty until it does.
- Councilmember Trinkle asked are the dogs vaccinated, Steve do you know that.
 - o Police Chief Steve Wayman replied the dogs are tagged and vaccinated yes.
- Councilmember Trinkle asked do we have to have tags on the chickens too.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski stated no, they have to be, are they caged, don't they have to be in an enclosed pen.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman replied they have an enclosed structure.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated they have an enclosed pen, but it says they have free roam of the back yard.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman replied they have a privacy fence in the back yard so they have free roam of the back yard but they also chicken coup
- Councilmember Gardner asked is that where the dogs are digging underneath the fence, in the back yard? Lonnie Nelson replied yes sir.
- Councilmember Gardner stated she has the chickens because of her allergies or something like that.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated I don't know.
 - Councilmember Buehler stated that's what it says.
 - Mayor Kirby stated that's what is says but they are not here to question, so if you're asking for special permission you outtabe here.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated I think we have 2 issues here right. We have 1 person who's not controlling their dogs and we also have the same person who has more animals than required.
- Councilmember Buehler stated and it was brought forward because of a complaint, not because they were trying to do the right thing before the ordinance.

The motion was unanimously denied.

Police Chief Steve Wayman stated what we'll do now is get the letter sent to them, we do give 10-15 days to get things moved out and the process started to have the animals down to a manageable number by City Code. So we'll get that started and try to get it out tomorrow or Monday morning and get them started on it.

Lansing Planning Commission Appointment: Councilmember Trinkle moved to appoint Frank Reyes to the Lansing Planning Commission for a three year term expiring on April 30, 2019. Councilmember McNeill seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Frank Reyes stated thank you for the opportunity and I'm looking forward to serve.

Award of Bid - Construction of 9 Mile Creek Sanitary Sewer Action Plan: Councilmember Trinkle moved to approve the bid from Linaweaver Construction for the construction of the 9 Mile Creek Sanitary Sewer Action Plan (City Project 15-01), in the amount of two million, one hundred thirty-five thousand, four hundred eighty-five dollars and zero cents. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion.

Councilmember McNeill asked who is doing the engineering stuff before they start digging.

- Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied that's already been completed by Alpha Omega and they did do rock cores on locations where we knew there was previously rock. We're replacing some line that runs up through the neighborhood and we knew from the 1981 plans that there was rock at that location, so they actually did rock cores there so we've got a pretty good handle on it.
 - Councilmember Trinkle asked that's not the same group that did it before.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied no.
 - Councilmember Garvey stated never use them again.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked so when this is done we'll have our 7 Mile and our 9 Mile Creek Action Plans completed.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied correct.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated and then we'll be good with KDHE.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied for the most part yes, and we move on to the next. We'll do a flow study and we'll reassess and see where we're at.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated and that will be 2018.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied given the construction timeline of this, this won't be wrapped up until next year, so we really want to hit it in the spring to do a meaningful flow study, I'd rather do that in the spring, so we would be looking at 2018.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 962 – An Ordinance Amending Court Costs Under Chapter 10, Article 1, Section 108 of the Code of the City of Lansing, Kansas: Councilmember Buehler moved to adopt Ordinance No. 962, amending court costs under Chapter 10, Article 1, Section 108 of the Code of the City of Lansing, Kansas, 2015 Edition, amending Ordinance 958 and other amendments thereto. Councilmember Trinkle seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 963 - An Ordinance Concerning the Fine and Bond Schedule Established by the Municipal Court Judge: Councilmember Buehler moved to adopt Ordinance No. 963, amending the fine and bond schedule for Lansing Municipal Court, as presented. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 964 - An Ordinance for Project Authorization for 9 Mile Creek: Councilmember McNeill moved to adopt Ordinance No. 964, an Ordinance of the City of Lansing, Kansas, authorizing and providing for the Alteration, Repair, or Reconstruction of Certain Existing Sanitary Sewers in the City; Authorizing and providing for the Construction of Interceptor Sewer Improvements in the City; and providing for the payment of the costs thereof. Councilmember Trinkle seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Resolution No. B-2-16 - Authorizing the Offering for Sale of General Obligation Bonds, Series 2016-A of the City of Lansing, Kansas: Councilmember Trinkle moved to adopt Resolution No. B-2-16, authorizing the offering for sale of General Obligation Bonds, Series 2016-A, of the City of Lansing, Kansas. Councilmember Studnicka seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Executive Session - Consultation with Attorney: Councilmember Studnicka moved to recess into executive session for consultation with an attorney on matters that would be privileged in Attorney-Client relationship for 10 minutes, beginning at 7:17 p.m. and returning at 7:27 p.m. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Garvey moved to return to open session at 7:27 p.m. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Executive Session - Economic Development: Councilmember Studnicka moved to recess into executive session for economic development purposes to discuss confidential data relating to the financial affairs or trade secrets of corporations, partnerships, trusts, and individual proprietorship for 15 minutes, beginning at 7:28 p.m. and returning at 7:43 p.m. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Garvey moved to return to open session at 7:43 p.m. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Executive Session – Non-Elected Personnel: Councilmember Studnicka moved to recess into executive session to discuss personnel matters related to non-elected personnel for 30 minutes, beginning at 7:44 p.m. and returning at 8:14 p.m. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was approved, with Councilmember McNeill voting against the motion.
Councilmember Studnicka moved to return to open session at 8:14 p.m. Councilmember Trinkle seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.
Councilmember Studnicka moved to authorize the Mayor to sign an amendment to the City Administrator's contract based on the results of the performance evaluation. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.
REPORTS: City Attorney: City Attorney had nothing to report. City Engineer: City Engineer has nothing to report. City Administrator: City Administrator Tim Vandall reminded the Governing Body to turn in the Capital and Supplemental ranking sheets to the Mayor, Finance Director, or himself. Governing Body: Mayor Kirby stated that on July 12 th from 7-9 p.m. the Lansing Council Chambers has been reserved for an open house discussion about citizens forming a Lansing City Foundation. This would be separate from the City, but there has been talk in the public about it, and we want to see if there is truly interest. At the Independence Day celebration from 6-9 p.m., the Klemp family has graciously sponsored a dunk tank where residents can donate funds to dunk City officials, the Police Chief, and Fire Chief. The funds raised will be split between breast cancer research and the Mayor's Christmas Tree Fund. Councilmember Pawlowski confirmed with Community and Economic Development Director Stefanie Leif that funds are available for training for the Planning Commission and Board of Zoning Appeals, as she has heard nothing but great things about the Land Use Training and is excited to attend. She is hopeful that people will be interested in starting a Lansing City Foundation as she sees it as a good avenue for the community to donate something for the public good that is not directly tied to the City as a whole, by allowing the Foundation to sponsor items that have been traditionally sponsored by the City in hopes to further participation and community involvement. Councilmember Buehler provided a fun fact, on this day in 1884, the very first roller coaster called the Switchback Railway opened on Coney Island in New York. Councilmember McNeill thanked Frank Reyes for volunteering for the Planning Commission. Councilmember Studnicka thanked Community and Economic Development Director Stefanie Leif for her assistance on the property on Hithergreen and getting it cleaned up, he had another property he needs Code Enforcement
<u>ADJOURNMENT:</u> Councilmember Studnicka moved to adjourn. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was approved, with Councilmember Trinkle voting against the motion. The meeting was adjourned at 8:21 p.m.



Q1 In the past year, have you read the Lansing Connection, a quarterly publication from the city of Lansing?



Q2 In What Format Was The Lansing Connection? Check all that apply.



Q3 If you currently read the newsprint version of the Lansing Connection but in the future that option no longer existed, would you seek to find the Lansing Connection online?



SUBJECT:

Ordinance No. 965 Amending the City of Lansing Zoning Ordinance

At its July 7, 2016, City Council meeting, the City Council will consider adopting Ordinance No. 965 amending the city of Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Article 14, Section 3 "Definitions" and Lansing Zoning Ordinance Appendices A and B "Permitted and Conditionally Permitted Uses." The proposed amendments would add definitions and allow kennels-boarding and breeding, grooming, and animal shelter as conditional uses in the B-3 Commercial Business and I-1 Light Industrial zoning districts.

It has come to staff's attention that animal-related uses have limited allowance in the city's established zoning districts. Historically, the city has had grooming and kennel establishments in an I-1 zone and issued a conditional use permit for a planned animal shelter in the B-3 zone. Staff is suggesting amendments to the zoning ordinance to reflect uses that may fit certain zones and areas of town. The proposal is for these uses to be conditional, which would allow both the Planning Commission and City Council to evaluate each application.

THE CURRENT CODE ALLOWS THE FOLLOWING:

Animal Shelter:

- Not defined in the Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Article 14.
- Not specifically permitted or conditionally permitted in any zones per Appendices A and B

Kennel-Boarding and Breeding:

- Defined in Article 14: "Kennel: Any place, area, building, or structure where dogs or cats or other household domestic pets are boarded, bred, housed, cared for, fed, or trained by other than the owner. The occasional raising and sales of a litter of kittens or puppies or other household domestic pets shall not constitute a kennel."
- Conditional Use in A-1 zone
- Not permitted or conditionally permitted in any other zones per Appendices A and B

Pets and Pet Grooming-Retail:

- Not specifically defined in Article 14
- Permitted in B-1 and B-2 zones
- Conditional use in B-3 zone
- Not permitted or conditionally permitted in any other zones per Appendices A and B

STAFF PROPOSES THE FOLLOWING TEXT AMENDMENTS:

Animal Shelter:

- Add definition to Article 14 to read: "Animal Shelter: A non-profit or publicly owned and operated facility where stray, unwanted, lost or abandoned domestic animals are housed for the purpose of providing temporary kenneling and finding homes for the animals. A shelter may also include veterinary services and training for shelter animals and animal welfare and humane education for the public."
- Add to Appendices A and B the allowance of "Animal Shelter" as a conditional use in B-3 and I-1 zones.

Kennels-Boarding and Breeding:

- No suggested change to definition
- Add to Appendices A and B the allowance of "Kennels-Boarding and Breeding" as a conditional use in B-3 and I-1 zones.

Pets and Pet Grooming-Retail:

- Add definition to Article 14 to read: "Pets and Pet Grooming-Retail: An establishment providing services for household pets that may include bathing, grooming, clipping, retail, and day care of pets for less than 24 hours."
- Add to Appendices A and B the allowance of "Pets and Pet Grooming-Retail" as a conditional use in I-1 zone.

PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION: A public hearing notice was published in the *Leavenworth Times* on May 24, 2016, for a hearing before the Planning Commission on June 15, 2016. At its meeting of June 15, 2016, the Planning Commission held a public hearing and unanimously voted to recommend to the City Council approval of the proposed text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance. A copy of the meeting minutes and related documents are attached.

Action: Adopt Ordinance No. 965 amending the city of Lansing Zoning Ordinance.

ORDINANCE NO. 965

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS, AMENDING THE ZONING ORDINANCE, AS ADOPTED BY REFERENCE IN LANSING CITY CODE, SECTION 17-101; FURTHER AMENDING ARTICLE 14, SECTION 3, AND APPENDICES A AND B.

WHEREAS, the Planning Commission of the city of Lansing has recommended to amend the adopted zoning ordinance, Article 14, Section 3 "Definitions" and Appendices A and B "Permitted and Conditionally Permitted Uses." The official zoning ordinance is adopted by reference in Lansing City Code, Section 17-101.

WHEREAS, after proper legal publication and notice pursuant to the statutes of the State of Kansas, a public hearing was held by the Planning Commission on June 15, 2016, at 7:00 p.m. at the Lansing City Hall, Lansing, Kansas; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Article 14, Section 3, "Definitions" is hereby amended to add the following definitions to wit:

Animal Shelter: A non-profit or publicly-owned and operated facility where stray, unwanted, lost or abandoned domesticated animals, as defined in Chapter 2, Article 1, Section 102 of the Code of the City of Lansing, Kansas, are housed for the purpose of providing temporary kenneling and for finding homes for the animals. An animal shelter may also include on-site veterinary services, training for shelter animals, and public education regarding animal welfare and humane treatment.

Pets and Pet Grooming-Retail: An establishment providing services for household pets that may include bathing, grooming, clipping, retail, and day care of pets for less than 24 hours.

- **SECTION 2.** Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Appendix A is hereby amended pursuant to Exhibit A of this ordinance.
- **SECTION 3.** Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Appendix B is hereby amended pursuant to Exhibit B of this ordinance.
- **SECTION 4.** SEVERABILITY. If any section, clause, sentence, or phrase of this ordinance is found to be unconstitutional or is otherwise held invalid by a court of competent jurisdiction, it shall not affect the validity of any remaining parts of this ordinance.
- **SECTION 5.** EFFECTIVE DATE. This ordinance shall take effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication by summary in the official city newspaper.

Lansing Planning Commission Regular Meeting June 15, 2016

These minutes have not yet been approved.

<u>Call to Order</u> – The meeting of the Lansing Planning Commission was called to order by Chairman Brian Schwanz at 7:00 p.m. Also present were Vice-Chairman Ron Barry and Commissioners Mike Suozzo, Kirsten Moreland, and Chuck Holland. Commissioner Chad Neidig was unable to attend, and there is currently one vacancy on the Planning Commission. Chairman Schwanz noted there was a quorum present.

<u>Approval of Minutes – May 18, 2016, Regular Meeting</u> – Commissioner Suozzo made a motion to approve the minutes of the May 18, 2016, regular meeting, seconded by Commissioner Holland. The motion was unanimously approved.

Old Business - none

New Business - 1. Public Hearing – To give consideration to amendments to the Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Article 14, Section 3 "Definitions" and Lansing Zoning Ordinance, Appendices A and B "Permitted and Conditionally Permitted Uses."

Chairman Schwanz opened the public hearing at 7:02 p.m. At this time, Crystal Swann Blackdeer of the Leavenworth County Humane Society, stated they own property in the Lansing Business Center and have recently rented property from the Leavenworth County Co-op in Lansing that will be opening around the beginning of July. She stated she is speaking tonight to encourage the Commission to accept the proposal to allow some animal uses in some additional zoning districts. She stated she believes Lansing is missing an opportunity for its residents to use services located in Lansing, as there are no groomers, no dog boarding or day care, and only one veterinarian. She again encouraged Commissioners to consider allowing Lansing residents to patronize Lansing businesses for their animal and pet needs.

Since no one else wished to speak, Chairman Schwanz closed the public hearing at 7:04 p.m. and stated that the 14-day protest period began immediately following the closure of the public hearing.

Chairman Schwanz then asked if any Commissioners had any questions or items for discussion. Commissioner Moreland asked about sewer and water concerns in regard to the Co-op building, but Chairman Schwanz clarified this discussion is regarding use, not just for that one location, but for anything zoned that way for which a conditional use could be requested.

Community and Economic Development Director Stefanie Leif noted that the Leavenworth County Humane Society will be bringing a conditional use permit for that location before the Planning Commission at its July meeting.

Vice-Chairman Barry asked, since there is a 14-day protest period and then, if approved has to be brought before the City Council, will there be enough time for that conditional use permit to be brought to the Commission in July. City Attorney Greg Robinson stated he saw no reason why it couldn't be on the first City Council meeting in July, which is July 7, so there would be enough time.

Commissioner Holland stated he noted there are no defined limits on any of the definitions, such as how many animals would be allowed, and wondered if a maximum should be put on them. Vice-Chairman Barry then stated, having the wording the way it is, if he wanted to do something in his garage, he would be authorized to come in to request a conditional use permit for a kennel. City Attorney Greg Robinson stated there was a similar situation to this where someone had put in an animal shelter in her basement and spent a lot of money on it, and the conditional use permit application was denied. Mr. Robinson stated that any time a conditional use is presented, there's going to be a minimum standard that has to be met and the application has to be weighed by the Planning Commission. Mr. Robinson further stated that when you put absolutes in the definitions, it makes it nearly impossible for people or organizations to meet every criteria. Vice-Chairman Barry then asked if staff looked at any kind of guidelines for wording or was it purposely vague and if so, why. Ms. Leif stated she did leave the definition for animal shelter purposely vague, but does have in there that it would be for public or non-profit.

At this time, Mrs. Blackdeer stated she might be able to allay some of the fears by stating that all kennels, shelters, rescues, and pet shops have to be licensed through the state of Kansas Department of Agriculture, so there are minimum basic standards that have to be met as far as animal care, sanitation, and health and safety of the community. City Inspector Rebecca Savidge then stated that the city also does inspections and has regulations in the Zoning Ordinance that have to be followed. She also stated these proposed changes, as she's reading them, are not allowed in residential zoning.

Chairman Schwanz then asked what staff's recommendation is and Ms. Leif stated she is comfortable with the changes the way they read, but if the Commission wants to add numbers in there, it can be done, but questioned whether we wanted to be that specific or just evaluate each application as it's presented to the Commission.

Commissioner Holland asked if the state rules mandate certain square footage per animal, which would dictate the number of animals, and Mrs. Blackdeer stated they do, as well as looking for things like rust, drainage, feeding, storage of food, etc.

Commissioner Suozzo asked if this wouldn't be like the way we use state regulations for child care and Ms. Savidge stated that one of our requirements for occupancy is that they have to provide a copy of that state approval.

Commissioner Moreland then asked Ms. Savidge if these changes would have a significant impact on anyone else and Ms. Savidge said "no".

Chairman Schwanz asked if there was any further discussion and entertained a motion. Vice-Chairman Barry asked exactly what it needed in the motion and Chairman Schwanz stated it would be to either recommend approval of the amendments to the Lansing Zoning Ordinance or a recommendation not to approve the amendments. Vice-Chairman Barry then asked what happens if applicants come in requesting a conditional use permit before having a state license and Mr. Robinson stated that shouldn't happen, as one of the first questions the Commission is

going to ask is if they have their state licensure. He said if they say "no" then he would assume the Commission would tell them to come back when they do. Chairman Schwanz then asked if his recommendation is that staff would recommend disapproval of the application if there is no state license and Ms. Savidge stated she'd never brought one before the Commission without a state license in the packet. Vice-Chairman Barry asked if verbiage should be added stating that the state license has to be obtained prior to submission of a conditional use permit. Commissioner Moreland asked if that can be done if the state is looking for them to have all the plumbing in place, etc. so they can inspect. Mr. Robinson stated that if someone puts a lot of money into one of these places and submits an application without the state license, the Commission can always put on, as a condition of approval, that the state license must be obtained. Ms. Savidge reiterated that a condition of occupancy is having that state license.

Ms. Leif also stated that in the conditional use section of the code, there are several uses where we have additional requirements, such as day cares, adult-based businesses, and kennels, so language could be added to upcoming code revisions if the Commission wants to do that in order to have that to go by when applications are presented.

Vice-Chairman Barry then made a motion to recommend approval of staff's recommendation of proposed text amendments to the Lansing Zoning Ordinance to the City Council, seconded by Commissioner Holland. The motion passed unanimously. Chairman Schwanz noted it would go before the City Council on July 7.

Notices and Communications - none

Reports – Commission and Staff Members – Ms. Leif stated that at a previous meeting, the Commission had asked to see a list of conditional use permits that would be coming up for renewal. She stated the two that were up for renewal this year are no longer in business. Ms. Leif asked if people are notified when their conditional use permit is up. Secretary Cindy Tripp stated people are sent a letter when their application is first approved which states when it has to be renewed. She also stated she contacts them several months before the permit is to expire and if still in business, sends out an application packet to them. Chairman Schwanz stated the next one due up will be in August of 2017, which is a child care permit. Mr. Robinson asked if the business moves out of town or closes, is the permit just terminated immediately and Ms. Savidge stated it is. Chairman Schwanz noted, however, that according to our ordinance, the property is still conditionally permitted, which is in conflict with Kansas case law, something that will be discussed shortly in the work session.

Chairman Schwanz then noted the Mid-America Regional Council Training Schedule found on the agenda and it was noted that the webinar conference for June 29 is one that has to actually be attended in person. Ms. Leif stated there is another resource in state chapters of APA, which will offer free webinars that can be watched at home. She stated she would provide more information on these in the future. Commissioner Moreland asked if the Kansas state chapter could be a resource for bringing people here to train, also, and Ms. Leif said she thought it could.

Chairman Schwanz then stated he would be in attendance at tomorrow night's City Council meeting to thank the Council and Stefanie for the Land Use Training, let them know how well it was received, and encourage them to continue to fund training like that in the future. He stated he also wants to give them a heads up that they could be seeing future text amendments to the Zoning Ordinance and Subdivision Regulations.

<u>Adjournment</u> – Chairman Schwanz entertained a motion for adjournment and Commissioner Moreland made the motion to adjourn. Commissioner Suozzo seconded the motion and it was approved by acclamation. The meeting adjourned at 7:28 p.m.
