The Regular Meeting Minutes for August 2, 2018, are enclosed for your review.

Action: Staff recommends a motion to approve the Regular Meeting Minutes for August 2, 2018, as presented.

Call To Order:

The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor Mike Smith at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call:

Mayor Mike Smith called the roll and indicated which Councilmembers were in attendance.

Councilmembers Present:

Ward 1: Dave Trinkle

OLD BUSINESS:

Approval of Minutes: Councilmember McNeill moved to approve the regular meeting minutes of July 19, 2018, as presented. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was approved with Councilmember Buehler abstaining from the vote.

Audience Participation: Mayor Smith called for audience participation and a community member came forward. Kevin Gardner at 1012 N 4th St spoke in regard to previous meetings about the Fire Department. Mr. Gardner mentioned the Council kept the meeting civil which allows the lines of communication to stay open. He stated Councilmember McNeill has always been upfront and honest with people and is concerned about how the taxpayer's money is spent. Mr. Gardner feels perception is more of a mental impression than truth and stated the Council is just as concerned how \$25 is spent as it is about \$2.5 million. Mr. Gardner stated the Council can have various types of information in front of them at any given meeting and since they aren't allowed to congregate outside due to law, there are times when info needs to be exchanged. He expressed Councilmember Pawlowski always comes prepared to meetings and makes sure questions are answered and/or clarified. Mr. Gardner stated he trusts the Council to make decisions based on the stability and future of Lansing. He finished with stating Lansing is fortunate to have a Council who is both experienced and dedicated to its residents, businesses and the future.

Presentation: Recognition Plaque Presentation – Alliance Against Family Violence: Stan Cherrie, Board Member for Alliance Against Family Violence (AAFV), presented the history of the advocacy service organization. Mr. Cherrie spoke of the organizations mission to offer services and programs for victims and survivors of sexual and/or domestic violence within their community. Mr. Cherrie stated the purpose of AAFV is not only to provide services but also raise community awareness about family violence, sexual and domestic violence, available community resources, and services and programs within the organization. AAFV services include a 24/7 crisis hot line, emergency shelter, police response advocacy, court advocacy, sexual assault and medical advocacy, food, clothing, transitional housing, access to support groups, and outreach services. Mr. Cherrie explained the funding procedures. Unfortunately, cash flow was interrupted and the Alliance had to temporarily suspend services within Leavenworth County as of November 2017. AAFV has received matching grants from the city of Leavenworth and the County. The organization has been productive in recruiting board members, fundraising, paying all bills, securing shelter, and a title for shelter to name a few. Mr. Cherrie stated they cannot open their doors until they are fiscally sound and they are actively working towards that.

- Police Chief Steve Wayman spoke to the benefits of the having an organization like Alliance Against Family Violence. He spoke that without the services of this type of organizations, victims don't know what to do and get lost in the court system so they go back to the abuser that has control over them. AAFV offers a good support for the police and if it helps reduce a percentage of abuse then it's worth it.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski stated in the past we've included a funding line in your budget.
 - Police Chief Steve Wayman stated in the past we've had direct funding into the Alliance. We switched out of it because a lot of non-profits came in asking for money and the Council didn't feel comfortable with just giving money out so we switched over to more they would provide training for the police department. And then we'd be invoiced for the training scenarios. They'd invoice us 3,4,5 times a year and we'd pay that out. They were funded from the City of Lansing by providing a service directly to the Police Department.
- Mayor Smith responded there is a non-profit organization funding policy that can be filled out and sent before the governing body for consideration. Mayor Smith agrees with the Chief that it helps the victims but also helps police get back on patrol. He said this is a service he can't talk about high enough and he appreciates Mr. Cherrie bringing the presentation to the Council.
- Councilmember Brungardt stated he believes they, as a Council, need to designate some money for organizations like this. St. Vincent Clinic is another great organization and you all manage to work together and help each other. He stated he doesn't know the magic number but we have a lot of citizens in this community that need these services. Councilmember Brungardt said it doesn't need to be an outrageous number but with an application, we can decide how to disburse those funds whatever the amount is.

- Councilmember Buehler states let's put it on a work session so we can talk about it. Beth can come talk to us so we can come up with a plan.
- Mayor Smith suggested the Lansing Leavenworth Leadership Class who has projects they do every year. Talk to the Chamber and get on with that, that's a good group to go out and help and do some remodeling.
- Councilmember Brungardt stated he didn't know how often they get to hear success cases but one of the families you helped before you shut down was from out of state. The mom was getting away from a very abusive situation. I told her I really admired her for doing this and she said someone was going to die if we didn't. They came here, you guys stepped in, worked your magic and with a lot of support through our community and other resources, this family is thriving now. The mom is employed, they have a decent place to live and they have a support system and it's pretty cool to see. I wanted you to hear the success cases.

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:

Public Hearing on and Consideration of the Proposed 2019 Budget: Councilmember Brungardt moved to open the public hearing for the 2019 Budget. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

- Mayor Smith asked is there anyone who would like to address the Council on this.
 - o Jeanette Labbe-Holdeman stated I guess I would.
 - Mayor Smith responded come on up Jeanette.
 - Jeanette Labbe-Holdeman stated I just want to congratulate you on managing the mill levy. I know this is like the third year that we haven't raised the mill levy which means we are doing amazing work with the money that we've got. So I just would like to say thank you very much.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski stated Tim and his staff has done a good job on that.
- Mayor Smith responded he appreciated the staff being credited for that and it's nice to hear these comments after been dealing with the Fire District so thank you very much.
 - o Councilmember Garvey stated but don't get used to it.
- Mayor Smith stated ok, nobody else. I need a motion to close the public hearing for 2019 budget.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated wait a minute, so this.
 - Councilmember Garvey replied closing it.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated I have some questions about the budget.
 - o Mayor Smith responded we can still talk, we can close it and still talk before we approve it, ok.

Councilmember Buehler moved to close the public hearing for the 2019 Budget. Councilmember Trinkle seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

- Councilmember McNeill asked on the sales tax, \$.45. I think it's on page 13. I got a question on the transfer to debt services \$550,000.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied that is an estimate right now.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated that's a split between the roads and the parks, right?
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford responded correct.
 - o Councilmember McNeill stated from those revenues and do we know it's \$550,000.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated we don't know yet. We won't know really until we sell the bonds.
 - Councilmember McNeill replied ok, well my concern is the percentage. The debt is what we're going to pay whatever that ends up being and the rest will go to Parks. Is that the plan?
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded as of right now that is what we had talked about. Yeah.
 - Councilmember McNeill replied ok. I just want to make sure. I saw the \$550,000 and the \$129,200.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated those are just kind of a best guess right now until we get final numbers.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated we aren't going to get much Park work done with the \$129,200.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall responded and you could probably look at that as maybe a worst case scenario figure like if the bids come in higher than we're anticipating. You can probably look at it like that.
- Councilmember McNeill stated but we'll reengage once we know what the debt is.
- Finance Director Beth Sanford replied once we know those final numbers. Those numbers can change and you can do a transfer of budget authority.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked can we not have a whole year of the sales tax yet either so it's all kind of a guess.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall replied 7 or 8 months.
- Finance Director Beth Sanford stated this is all kind of an estimate. We don't have good data yet. And you'll notice this year, I kind of have some budgeted for Bernard Park and we're probably not going to spend anything until we have everything in place. This is just kind of an estimate of how we might see it play out. I think the intent was to let it build for that first year so if we don't spend that money, that carries over and increases the amount that is there for next year.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski responded right because we keep track of this completely separate.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford answered yes, this is only for debt service.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated for that \$.45.
 - o Finance Director Beth Sanford replied yeah.
- Mayor Smith asked any other questions for Beth on the budget. Seeing there's not a motion to approve, I'm sorry Dave. Go ahead.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated well, maybe I misunderstood but in our study session but I'd sure like to maybe work hard next year on getting something for the alley. I mean we talked about it and I don't see anything. I quess it got swept under the carpet again.
 - o Finance Director Beth Sanford responded I think that was in our CIP proposal.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied we talked about doing one this year.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford responded yeah, we talked about maybe doing one to see how it went.
 - o City Administrator Tim Vandall stated I know we spent \$4-5,000 engaging in engineers to talk about what it would take to do it. So we haven't just blown that off. I know we talked to an engineer about what it would take.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied well I mean. I didn't see it in the budget. I thought maybe, I didn't mean that maybe, we have to do what we have to do but I thought we'd try to get one done this next budget cycle.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied yeah because I remember the engineer kind of gave us an estimate as far as what it would take and I think their estimate was doing them all. I know we verbally talked about doing one because we didn't want to do ten of them. But we didn't want to do ten and then have them all get torn up by xyz. We kind of wanted one as a trial run.
 - Councilmember Trinkle responded pick one a year.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated try to see how trucks did on it and see what kind of trouble they had.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall asked do you recall if we did include that or not off the top of your head.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied that is in the CIP, the Capital Improvements Budget which is on page 13 if you're following along.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated I mean none of the roads are broke out in there.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied yeah, it doesn't break out into great detail.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated I mean we talked about a line item for it or however they were going to do it. I didn't know if it was included or not.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied it would probably just go under street.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied street contract.
 - Mayor Smith asked does that happen when you do, bring back the list of everything to us that you want to repair. Is that where it would come into play? You know like when the street repair.

- Councilmember McNeill stated Jeff has the priority.
- Public Works Jeff Rupp responded yeah we probably would have included it in the street CIP if it was selected to do a street or anything like that, it would be included in that group because it's just too much money to bring the companies in separately.
- Mayor Smith stated that makes sense. Do you have any idea what one of them would be? A rough idea to do just one.
- Public Works Director Jeff Rupp stated I can kind of break it down out of the package because the engineer did a review of the entire selection of streets that were looked at alleys and gave us a total price. But I can probably come close to what one is but I would have to review it.
- o Councilmember McNeill responded I thought the discussion was that it wasn't in there as a specific item but as we did roads that were in and around, if we could knock one out with the excess tied into a road that we'd try to do that.
- Public Works Director Jeff Rupp stated well we still have time to make some adjustments for the 2019 budget. This year it would have been tough to try to squeeze that in because the roads were set and quantities were set.
- Mayor Smith replied no we're talking next year.
- Councilmember McNeill replied he's talking next year.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated well I am going to keep on bringing it up, it's been 20 some years now.
- Councilmember McNeill responded no, but we did talk about it for 19.
 - Mayor Smith stated we did, we did.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied like I said earlier too. We did invest a little bit of money engaging an engineer to figure out what it would take to do it.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated the neighborhood over there would be all appreciative, their appreciative of it. I mean you'll have to bring your lawnmower and mow the center of the alley, maybe to get to some of the bad ones. Ok, that was my only question.
- Mayor Smith asked anymore comments to Beth or anybody on the budget.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated good job on the budget.
 - Mayor Smith replied I thought so too.

Councilmember Trinkle moved to approve the 2019 Budget. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1001 - Sewer & Trash Disposal Assessment: Councilmember Brungardt moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1001 for assessment of delinquent sewer and trash bills. Councilmember Buehler seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Pawlowski asked Beth do you know how much this is total?
 - o Finance Director Beth Sanford replied yep, it's about \$88,000 which is down from last year which was at about \$111,500.
 - Mayor Smith replied I do like that.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked and these are just property owners.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied these are only property owners.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked and those go to 3rd party.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated yes, we have a 3rd party.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski asked do you have any idea how much that is just off hand.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford responded not off the top of my head because typically we do this part first and then we do the next one.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated I know you've explained this a hundred and fifty times. Say somebody has a \$1200 bill on here and they fail to pay it and it goes assessed to their taxes. That stays there and stays there If they come with another \$1200 the next, when does it stop? Am I thinking the way that's working.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated it goes on their tax bill.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford responded it's on their property tax bill so when they pay their tax.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied when they pay their tax bill, they have to pay that too.

- Councilmember Pawlowski stated and if they don't they go into arrears on their property tax bill.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated typically collection rate is pretty high on these because the collection rate last year we received in 99% of what we assessed against property tax rules. People are paying their property taxes that is included in their property tax bill.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied I know we get a percentage of it back, after they collect it however that works. Some of these are \$1,000 this year, \$1,000 next year.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked don't we get all this back.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied we get all this.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated because they put the fees and stuff on top of it so we get all this back.
 - Councilmember Trinkle responded like I said \$1000 this year. a \$1,000 next year. I mean pretty soon their going to have \$30,000 tax bill if something doesn't start.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied no because we do it every year.
- Mayor Smith stated pay me now, pay me later.
- Councilmember Pawlowski responded it won't go that far.
- Finance Director Beth Sanford stated once we put this on the tax roll, we remove it from their account. So their account gets reduced by this amount of money. In fact, we've had a couple of people call and go, you know my bill is a lot lower. Well it's because we sent a piece of it to collections.
- Councilmember Trinkle replied it's starting all over. But then when their property taxes come due if they fail to pay their total with this assessment on it then that is when they go into the tax sales, the houses. Ok, I thought that is what you told us a hundred times before.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked if the house here is in foreclosure, do we end up with that money too.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford stated we try to catch it, before we send the final list to the county, we look again to make sure that none of these houses have changed hands and that we are assessing the wrong person. A lot of times the bank, the closing agencies will call us and ask if there is an assessment and they will pay it off. Just to have it paid off.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated I have to tell them to do that.
- Mayor Smith asked any other questions.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Ordinance No. 1002 - Weed Removal Assessment: Councilmember Buehler moved to adopt Ordinance No. 1002 for assessment of delinquent fees for weed removal. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion.

- Councilmember Trinkle asked are these this year's billing or is this from last year because they didn't pay.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied well, it would be from the last time, anything from the last time we assessed through this year.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated one of them had last year's date on it. I mean has it been a year since we've been trying to get them to pay for a year.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied if it fell past the date where we sent out the assessment then we would be collecting this year.
 - Councilmember Trinkle responded collect it this year.
- Councilmember McNeill asked when is the, does this come up for bid. I mean, how do we do this? What is the process? We hire somebody to go mow it and then we bill them. And then we charge them \$100 for us having to get somebody to mow it.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated we take bids.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied yeah. I don't know if it's \$100.
 - Councilmember McNeill replied well, first remediation administrative fee \$100. It cost \$100 a mow so it's \$200. The other company that evidently won the bid charged \$200 to mow the lawn and this is on Holiday Dr. and I can tell you and then we charge another \$100 fee and then their mower blade broke so they charged another \$55. I mean that seems like highway robbery.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated most of the time the properties are in foreclosure.

- Councilmember Garvey responded I say, why do we have to pay for a broken blade? That's your maintenance.
 - o Councilmember McNeill replied I know, I know. So we put these out for, I mean a bid on it. Is that what we do? What's the process? I mean, don't we have somebody who will just mow the lawn and then we bill them for it.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied no.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated we don't have staff do that.
 - o Councilmember McNeill replied no, I mean can't you make a deal with somebody in town like a mowing service so anytime we have to have them do it. They get the business and then they go mow.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated that's what we do.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded I think that's what we do.
- Councilmember McNeill replied I mean, that's a total rip off because whoever tuned in Triple A Lawn is, I mean I wouldn't recommend them.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied a lot of times that grass is like baling height. It's like, you know, 24 inches.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded it takes longer than just mowing a regular yard.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated and sometimes there's junk in the yard that they have to move.
 - o Councilmember McNeill stated yeah, I know, I drive Holiday like every day. ok. It's my neighborhood.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied I know but I mean I've sold houses like that in Leavenworth. \$200 is nothing. I mean they pile all kinds of fees on top. It's relatively expensive to do that.
 - Councilmember McNeill responded ok, yeah, no, I don't believe that but alright. I mow lawns myself. Not for profit, just for fun.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated I think Tony wants a retirement job.
 - Councilmember McNeill responded no, I'm just saying that just looked outlandish to me.
 - Finance Director Beth Sanford replied I can pass along. Typically, honestly, what I do every year is I go are there any properties that we need to assess. And he sent me over what they would pay. I know it's a technicality but I can pass it along.
 - Councilmember McNeill asked are people in these homes or are these vacant homes that people just aren't up keeping. Do we know that?
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall responded I think that is a little bit beyond what Beth. Like I said, I think Beth gets the numbers from Code Enforcement as far as what we assess so we're not paying this.
 - Councilmember McNeill asked we got Code Enforcement in here.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski replied Matt's here.
 - Mayor Smith stated I think they do both. I think both people.
- Councilmember McNeill asked I mean, do you know if these are vacated properties and we're going to terminally mow and keep assessing them.
 - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded I don't know for sure. I can certainly look into it and find out.
 - Councilmember McNeill stated I mean, I know there's a couple on Holiday that are, you know, got the posters in the windows and the lawns always tall. I don't know if that's where we're doing it.
 - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied we can certainly look into it. One of the things we have, basically have an on call contractor that when we tell them there's a place that needs to be mowed. They go over and mow it. The one in particular that you're talking about with the broken motor blade, I don't know the specifics of what happened there. I would assume if they are billing us for that, that they hit something that was there and that is why they are billing us. It's not normal maintenance. If it's normal maintenance, I agree with you, we shouldn't be paying that. But you know if there was something buried in grass that was 24" tall and

they hit it and it caused damage to their mower, I kind of see a little bit of reason there. One of the things we can also look at, if Tim wanted to and the Council wanted to, is we could put some sort of fee out for mowing services for contract services like that and see if we can get an established hourly rate or something like that.

- Councilmember McNeill replied yeah, it doesn't seem to make a lot of sense to me.
 - Mayor Smith responded I thought, Matt, we went out for bid every couple of years.
 - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz stated we probably do. I just don't know how long it's been since then.
 - Mayor Smith replied ok.
 - Councilmember Garvey responded the key thing that jumped out at me is the hourly rate. Well the first crew was charged 2.5 hours was \$100 and the next crew charged 2.5 hours was \$200. So the rate is twice as much.
 - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied right and that may have to do with the height of the grass itself but like I said, to me if you going to bill that you put in there it's a flat hourly rate and it doesn't really matter what it takes for you to get it done. You pay x amount of dollars.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated since we're on the subject of grass, the 600 block of Beth, I know it's been a problem last year and they weren't mowing it. I don't know if you were here. It's an abandoned house, it's turned into a wildlife refuge. They got a big pile of brush outside, the roof of the house is falling in, the roof of the garage has fell in, grass is and the neighbors are all very concerned. I assume it's in probate.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall asked is that the one that's across from Russ.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied yes, yes and he cornered me again today about that.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated weren't there, I remember there were like Russian thistles or something.
 - o Councilmember Trinkle stated it's been in probate, now it's changed and now another one of the family members started arguing.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied yeah, I remember last year being in probate and I remember we were hoping last year it would get resolved but obviously it seems like it didn't.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated one brother and another brother to cousin, back down, back to somebody else. Some other family member got it. We still have to do something about the forest that's growing there. I mean groundhogs and foxes and everything else, probably everything living there.
 - Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz responded thistles are defined as noxious weeds. That's something we can do immediately. We don't have to wait forever.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated Dave, I'm going to send you Matt's cell phone number and you can text him like I do.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated oh I've got his cell, well I only use it if I need to.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski responded I text him all the time.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied so far I haven't needed to but it's the thing that you know, there's kids playing around. Neighbor lady runs the kids off, somebody's going to get hurt. It's run down, ceiling, roofs are falling in
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied I remember the roof on the garage was bad but the roof on the house is bad now too.
 - Councilmember Trinkle stated the roof on the house is going south now too.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall replied yeah I recall that from last year. We'll take a look at it.

- Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz asked what was the address again Mr. Trinkle.
 - Councilmember Trinkle replied it's right at the end, it's turn, it's 600 block of Beth, last one on the right.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall responded remember that dead end where you can kind of see, it's by that abandon church.
- Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied let's get together.
- Councilmember Trinkle stated 601, 600 or 601 Beth.
- Mayor Smith replied you can't miss it.
- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated we'll figure it out.
- Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz replied we'll get together.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked where are we.
 - City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner stated we have a motion to second to approve it.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated let's vote.

The motion was unanimously approved.

Tim Vandall and Jeff Rupp spoke to the City of Leavenworth about the K-7 and Eisenhower intersection. Peak hours make it a rough intersection to traverse, so options were discussed to help out that area if traffic increases in the coming years. Leavenworth has done traffic counts and had engineers look at it. There is an option to apply for a grant with 90-10 match with neither entity out that much money. Councilmember Trinkle mentioned when work begins on DeSoto people may switch to that intersection. Discussions will continue for this intersection. Tim mentioned the bid opening date for DeSoto Road is September 19th with Tim Vandall and Jeff Rupp being able to listen to it live stream. Over the next few months, the Council will see all the documents authorizing the bonds sales for that project. KDOT will be paid a lump sum around \$4 million and then KDOT will pay the contractor. Once the project is bid, there will be a better idea of how much is available for Bernard Park. Tim continued that the bids for Highland Park came back quite a bit higher than expected, so Jason Crum is doing some more research and the Council will be briefed at a later date. Tim stated that Deffenbaugh contacted the city about recycling issues since China is not accepting as much recycling as they used to. Defenbaugh wanted to open the lines of communication in regard to the importance of recycling. Tim closed his report with stated that the contract for the School Resource Officer should be available for the next Council meeting.

Governing Body: Councilmember Brungardt thanked Officer Hansen for his service.

Councilmember Garvey echoed Councilmember Brungardt sentiments. He also thanked Kevin Gardner for his statement, and said it was awesome to hear something positive for a change. He also thanked the Alliance Against Family Violence for their presentation and the work they do.

Councilmember Buehler provided a fun fact, on this day in 1776, delegates to the Continental Congress began signing the Declaration of Independence.

ORDINANCE NO. 1005

AN ORDINANCE INCORPORATING THE STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE BY REFERENCE

An ordinance regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas; incorporating by reference the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 46th Edition of 2018, with certain omissions, changes and additions; prescribing additional regulations; providing certain penalties and repealing Ordinance No. 981 and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the Governing Body of the City of Lansing, Kansas:

SECTION 1.

15-101. INCORPORATING STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE.

There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating traffic within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas, that certain standard traffic ordinance known as the Standard Traffic Ordinance for Kansas Cities, 46th Edition of 2018, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas, save and except such articles, sections, parts or portions as are hereafter omitted, deleted, modified or changed. One official copy of said Standard Traffic Ordinance shall be marked or stamped "Official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 1005," with all sections or portions thereof intended to be omitted or changed clearly marked to show any such omission or change and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the city clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours. The police department, municipal judge and all administrative departments of the city charged with enforcement of the ordinance shall be supplied, at the cost of the city, such number of office copies of such Standard Traffic Ordinance similarly marked as may be deemed expedient.

15-102. OMISSIONS, CHANGES, ADDITIONS AND DELETIONS TO THE STANDARD TRAFFIC ORDINANCE FOR KANSAS CITIES

Article 1: Section 1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance, relating to definitions, is hereby amended to add as follows:

Motorized Mini Bikes. Any motorized mini bike not more than 51 inches in length, 14 inches in width and 30 inches in height, by the manufacturer's specifications which may be propelled by either gasoline or electric power and having a seat designed to be straddled by the operator, except a motorized bicycle and electric-assisted bicycle.

(All other definitions not modified, deleted or changed shall remain in effect.)

Article 4: Section 17 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Display of Unauthorized Signs, Signals or Markings.

- (a) No person shall place, maintain or display upon or in view of any highway any unauthorized sign, signal, marking or device which purports to be or is an imitation of or resembles an official traffic-control device or railroad sign or signal, or which attempts to direct the movement of traffic, or which hides from view or interferes with the effectiveness of any official traffic-control device or any railroad sign or signal.
- (b) No person shall place or maintain nor shall any public authority permit upon any highway any official traffic control device bearing thereon any commercial advertising, except for business signs included as part of official motorist service panels or roadside area information panels approved by the secretary of transportation.
- (c) This section shall not be deemed to prohibit the erection upon private property adjacent to highways of signs giving useful directional information and of a type that cannot be mistaken for official signs.
- (d) Every such prohibited sign, signal, or marking is hereby declared to be a public nuisance and the governing body is hereby empowered to remove the same or cause it to be removed without notice.
- (e) Traffic regulations on Private Property. Whenever the person in possession or control of any private property used by the public for purposes of vehicular traffic by permission of the owner shall cause to be posted at each entrance thereto a permanently lettered clearly legible sign with the following legend:

"TRAFFIC REGULATIONS OF THE CITY OF LANSING ENFORCED ON THIS PROPERTY. SPEED LIMIT 10 MPH." (OR AS POSTED.)

then such private property shall thereafter be deemed to be under the traffic regulations of the city as provided by law.

Article 7: Section 33 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Maximum Speed Limits.

- (a) Except as provided in subsection (b) and except when a special hazard exists that requires lower speed for compliance with K.S.A. 8-1557, and amendments thereto, the limits specified in this subsection or established as hereinafter authorized by law shall be maximum lawful speeds, and no person shall operate a vehicle at a speed in excess of such maximum limits:
 - (1) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any business district;
 - (2) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any park;

(3) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any posted school zone or any public thoroughfare on or across which children pass going to and from school during school days, including the following locations and times:

(4) All vehicles 20 miles per hour in any residential district and on other streets within the city, if said limits were set prior to 1994. All speed limits set after 1994 shall be 30 miles an hour in any residential district or other streets within the city except where modified by engineering and traffic investigation as provided hereafter in subsection (c) of this section.

The maximum speed limit established by or pursuant to this paragraph shall be of force and effect regardless of whether signs are posted giving notice thereof, and, notwithstanding any signs giving notice of minimum speed limit in excess of the limits established by or pursuant to this paragraph, shall not be of any force or effect, subject to the following exception.

Whenever the Public Works Director shall determine upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that any speed limit herein set forth is greater or less than is reasonable or safe under the conditions found to exist, the Public Works Director shall determine and declare a reasonable and safe speed limit consistent with applicable state and local statutes which shall be effective at all times or during daytime or nighttime or at such other times as may be determined when appropriate signs giving notice thereof are erected pursuant to Governing Body action and K.S.A. 8-1560 and 8-2002.

- (b) No person shall drive a school bus to or from school, or interschool or intraschool functions or activities, at a speed greater than 45 miles per hour on any roadway having dirt, sand or gravel surface, and in no event shall a school bus be driven to and from school or activities in excess of 55 miles per hour, notwithstanding any maximum speed limit in excess thereof. The provisions of this subsection shall also apply to buses used for the transportation of students enrolled in community junior colleges or area vocational schools, when such buses are transporting students to or from school functions or activities.
- (c) Speed limits on certain streets within the City of Lansing. The Governing Body, having determined upon the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation that the speed limit permitted under state law and Section 33 of the "Standard Traffic Ordinance" is greater or less than is reasonable under the conditions found to exist within the city, hereby determines and

declares that the reasonable and safe speed limit on the portion of the streets is as listed below. The Public Works Director is hereby directed to cause to have erected appropriate signs giving notice of such speed limit along the streets maintained by the city.

Article 14: Section 114.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of All-Terrain Vehicle

- A. Except as provided in subsection (b), (d), (e), and (f), it shall be unlawful for any person to operate an all-terrain vehicle:
 - 1. on any interstate highway, federal highway or state highway; or

- 2. on any city street, alley, public parking lot, right-of-way or upon property owned by the City of Lansing.
- B. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such all-terrain vehicles may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.
- C. No all-terrain vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street or road between sunset and sunrise unless equipped with lights as required by law for motorcycles.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.
- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), all-terrain vehicles owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such all-terrain vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance their duties.
- F. Any person operating an all-terrain vehicle pursuant to (b), (d), (e) and (f) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,100)

Article 14: Section 114.2 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of a Micro Utility Truck.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a micro utility truck:
 - 1. on any interstate highway, federal highway, or state highway; or
 - 2. within the corporate limits of any city unless authorized by such city.
- B. No micro utility truck may be operated on any public highway, street, or road unless such vehicle complies with the equipment requirements under the provisions of Article 17 of Chapter 8 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated and amendments thereto.
- C. The provisions of subsection (A), shall not prohibit a micro utility truck from crossing a federal or state highway.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or micro utility trucks owned and operated by persons

contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such micro utility trucks may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.

- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or micro utility trucks owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.
- F. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), micro utility trucks owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such micro utility trucks upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance their duties.
- G. Any person operating a micro utility truck pursuant to (d), (e) and (f) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,106)

Article 14: Sec. 114.5 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Unlawful Operation of a Work-Site Utility Vehicle.

- A. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a work-site utility vehicle:
 - 1. On any interstate highway, federal highway, or state highway; or
 - 2. Within the corporate limits of any city unless authorized by such city.
- B. No work-site utility vehicle shall be operated on any public highway, street, or road between sunset and sunrise unless equipped with lights as required by law for motorcycles.
- C. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by a county noxious weed department, or work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with a county noxious weed department or the Kansas Department of Transportation may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon the right-of-way of any federal highway or state highway for the purpose of eradicating noxious weeds and such work-site utility vehicles may be operated incidentally upon such federal highway or state highway and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the fulfillment of its eradication duties.
- D. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by the City of Lansing, Kansas, or work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by persons contracting with the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of its duties.

- E. Notwithstanding the provisions of subsection (a), work-site utility vehicles owned and operated by those agencies providing emergency and first-responder services for the City of Lansing, Kansas may be allowed to operate such work-site utility vehicles upon and within the corporate limits of the city as required in the performance of their duties.
- F. Any person operating a work-site utility vehicle pursuant to (c), (d) and (e) shall be subject to all of the duties applicable to a driver of a vehicle imposed by law. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-15,109)

Article 14: Sec. 114.6 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby added to read as follows:

<u>Unlawful Operation of a Motorized Mini Bike</u>. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate, or for the owner to permit the operation of, a motorized mini bike upon a street, highway, public parking lot, or property owned by the City of Lansing

Article 17: Section 181.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby added to read as follows:

One-way glass and sun screening devices on vehicles registered out of state; requirements, exceptions; penalties.

- (a) No motor vehicle which is required to be registered in another state and which is operated on the streets and highways of the City of Lansing shall be equipped with one-way glass or any sun screening device, as defined in Section 1, used in conjunction with windshields, side wings, front side windows, the side windows behind the driver, and/or rear windows that do not meet the following requirements:
 - (1) A sun screening device when used in conjunction with the windshield shall be nonreflective and shall not be red, yellow or amber in color. A sun screening device shall be used only along the top of the windshield and shall not extend downward beyond the AS1 line which is clearly defined and marked;
 - (2) a sun screening device when used in conjunction with the side wing or side windows located at the immediate right and left of the driver, the side windows immediately behind the driver and the rear most window shall be nonreflective; and
 - (3) the total light transmission shall not be less than 19% when a sun screening device is used in conjunction with other existing sun screening devices
- (b) Subsection (a)(3) shall not apply to a window of a law enforcement motor vehicle that is clearly identified as such by words or other symbols on the outside of the vehicle.
- (c) This section shall not prohibit labels, stickers or other informational signs that are required or permitted by state law.
- (d) Any person convicted of violating the provisions of this section shall be guilty of a traffic offense and shall be fined in an amount not to exceed \$500.

Article 19: Section 194 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance is hereby changed to read as follows:

Driving While License Canceled, Suspended or Revoked; Penalty.

- (a) 1. Any person who drives a motor vehicle on any street or highway at a time when such person's privilege so to do is canceled, suspended or revoked or while such person's privilege to obtain a driver's license is suspended or revoked pursuant to K.S.A. 8-252a and amendments thereto, shall upon a first conviction be punished by imprisonment for not more than six months or fined not to exceed \$1,000, or both such fine and imprisonment. On a second conviction of a violation of this section such person shall be punished by imprisonment for not more than one year or fined not to exceed \$2,500, or both such fine and imprisonment.
 - 2. No person shall be convicted under this section if such person was entitled at the time of arrest under K.S.A. 8-257 and amendments thereto, to the return of such person's driver's license.
 - 3. Except as otherwise provided by subsection (a)(4), every person convicted under this section shall be sentenced to at least five days' imprisonment and fined at least \$100 and upon a second conviction shall not be eligible for parole until completion of five days' imprisonment.

4. If a person:

- A. is convicted of a violation of this section, committed while the person's privilege to drive or privilege to obtain a driver's license was suspended or revoked for a violation of K.S.A. 8-2,144 or K.S.A. 8-1567, and amendments thereto, or any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or a law of another state, which ordinance or resolution or law prohibits the acts prohibited by those statutes; and
- B. is or has been also convicted of a violation of K.S.A. 8-2,144 or K.S.A. 8-1567, and amendments thereto, or any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or law of another state, which ordinance or resolution or law prohibits the acts prohibited by those statutes, committed while the person's privilege to drive or privilege to obtain a driver's license was so suspended or revoked, the person shall not be eligible for suspension of sentence, probation or parole until the person has served at least 90 days' imprisonment, and any fine imposed on such person shall be in addition to such a term of imprisonment.
- (b) For the purposes of determining whether a conviction is a first or second conviction in sentencing under this section, conviction includes a conviction of a violation of any ordinance of any city or resolution of any county or a law of any state which is in substantial conformity with this section. (K.S.A. Supp. 8-262)

Article 19: Section 195.1 of said Standard Traffic Ordinance relating to Operation of a Motor Vehicle When a Habitual Violator is hereby declared to be and is omitted and deleted.

15-103. TRAFFIC INFRACTIONS AND TRAFFIC OFFENSES

- A. An ordinance traffic infraction is a violation of any section of this ordinance that prescribes or requires the same behavior as that prescribed or required by a statutory provision that is classified as a traffic infraction in K.S.A. 8-2118.
- B. All traffic violations which are included within this ordinance and which are not ordinance traffic infractions, as defined in subsection (a) of this section, shall be considered traffic offenses.

15-104. PENALTIES

(See Article 20: Section 201 of the Standard Traffic Ordinances)

SECTION 2.

REPEAL. Ordinance No. 981, and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith, are hereby repealed.

ORDINANCE NO. 1006

AN ORDINANCE INCORPORATING THE UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE BY REFERENCE

An ordinance regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas; incorporating by reference the "Uniform Public Offense Code for Kansas Cities," 34th Edition of 2018 and repealing Ordinance No. 982 and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith.

Be it ordained by the Governing Body of the City of Lansing, Kansas:

SECTION 1.

12-101. INCORPORATING UNIFORM PUBLIC OFFENSE CODE.

There is hereby incorporated by reference for the purpose of regulating public offenses within the corporate limits of the City of Lansing, Kansas, that certain code known as the "Uniform Public Offense Code," 34th Edition of 2018, prepared and published in book form by the League of Kansas Municipalities, Topeka, Kansas. One official copy of said Uniform Public Offense Code shall be marked or stamped "official Copy as Adopted by Ordinance No. 1006," and to which shall be attached a copy of this ordinance, and filed with the City Clerk to be open to inspection and available to the public at all reasonable hours.

SECTION 2. MODIFICATIONS.

Article 5: Section 5.7 of said Uniform Public Offense Code, relating to selling/giving/furnishing tobacco products to a minor, is hereby declared to be and is omitted and deleted.

Article 6: Section 6.8 of said Uniform Public Offense Code, relating to criminal littering, is hereby amended to read as follows:

Criminal Littering

- (a) Criminal littering is recklessly depositing or causing to be deposited any object or substance into, upon or about:
 - (1) Any public street, highway, alley, road, right-of-way, park or other public place, or any lake, stream, watercourse, or other body of water, except by direction of some public officer or employee authorized by law to direct or permit such acts; or
 - (2) Any private property without the consent of the owner or occupant of such property.
 - (b) Criminal littering is an unclassified offense punishable:
 - (1) Upon a first conviction by a fine of not less than \$250 nor more than \$1,000;
 - (2) Upon a second conviction by a fine of not less than \$1,000 nor more than \$2,000; and

- (3) Upon a third or subsequent conviction by a fine of not less than \$2,000 nor more than \$4,000.
- (c) The provisions of Standard Traffic Ordinance Section 112.1, Littering from a motor vehicle, are excepted from the application of this section.

SECTION 3. REPEAL.

Chapter 12, Article IV – Drugs and Drug Paraphernalia of the Code of the City of Lansing Kansas, 2017, adopted as part of Ordinance No. 991, is hereby repealed.

Ordinance No. 982 is hereby repealed and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances of the City of Lansing in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Explanation: Based on verbal consensus from the budget work session and the joint meeting with USD469, we worked with USD 469 leadership on a School Resource Officer Agreement. Currently, we have Officer French slated to oversee the SRO duties on behalf of the City. For the initial few months, we anticipate approximately 20 hours per week. Once Officer French's replacement is found, we anticipate increasing his hours working with USD469.

Financial Considerations: The City will pay the SRO and oversee his performance and the District will reimburse the City based on the hours worked at District facilities. We anticipate the SRO to spend approximately 1,300 hours per year at the District, and the other 700 hours the officer would conduct regular duties within the Lansing Police Department.

Policy Considerations: The agreement has been vetted by attorneys from both parties, as well as the City's Finance Director, Police Chief, and City Administrator.

Action: Approve or disapprove School Resource Officer Agreement, as presented.

School Resource Officer Agreement

THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS, a municipal corporation, and THE LANSING POLICE DEPARTMENT, hereinafter referred to as "City;" and

LANSING UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT NO. 469, a political subdivision of the State of Kansas, hereinafter referred to as "District."

FOR AND IN CONSIDERATION OF the mutual promises, terms, covenants, and conditions set forth herein, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. Assignment, Duties and Status of School Resource Officers. The City shall assign, with approval of the school administration, a police officer to work in Lansing USD 469 as a School Resource Officer (SRO). During days that schools are not in session and students are not present, the SRO shall perform such duties as may be directed by the Police Chief.
- 2. Term. Subject to annual appropriations by City and all provisions of the Kansas Cash Basis Law, (K.S.A. 10-1112 and 10-1113), the Budget Law (K.S.A. 79-2935), and other laws of the State of Kansas, the term of this agreement shall be one (1) year commencing on the first day of the 2018-19 school year; provided that the parties by mutual agreement may extend this agreement by successive terms of one (1) year thereafter.
 - At all times, this agreement shall be construed and interpreted to be in compliance with Kansas law and the City reserves the right to unilaterally modify or terminate this agreement at any time if, in the opinion of its legal counsel, the contract may be deemed to violate the terms of such laws.
- 3. Relationship of Parties. The parties agree that this agreement is entered into for the purpose of encouraging and strengthening community policing efforts. At all times and in all respects, the SRO shall remain an employee of the City of Lansing, subject to departmental control and supervision through the established chain of command within the Lansing Police Department. Ultimate responsibility for supervision and direction of the SRO shall reside with the City's Police Chief or his/her designee. The District agrees to cooperate with the City in any administrative investigation regarding violations of Lansing Police Department procedures by an officer assigned to the District as an SRO. This agreement is not intended to and will not constitute, create, give rise to, or otherwise recognize a joint venture, partnership, or formal business association or organization of any kind between the parties, and the rights and obligations of the parties shall be only those expressly set forth in this Agreement.

4. Responsibilities of City.

- A. Select, assign and train the SRO; The Lansing USD 469 superintendent must approve the selected SRO in advance of his or her assignment.
- **B.** Provide direction and supervision to the SRO in the performance of the responsibilities in Section 6 herein; and

C. Provide scheduling and presence of SRO as detailed in Paragraph 7 herein.

5. Responsibilities of District.

- A. District shall provide the SRO a private, securable office and such services and equipment, including but not limited to a telephone, securable file cabinets and access to a computer, as necessary, at the school;
- **B.** District shall provide the SRO with access to student personal information forms, attendance records, and daily schedules as necessary for the performance of SRO duties.
- C. District shall ensure that administration and staff cooperate, to the extent allowed by law, with law enforcement investigations and any subsequent actions related to crime or criminal activity at the school.

6. SRO Responsibilities. The SRO shall:

- A. Work in concert with the school's administrative staff, and, to that end, shall meet regularly with such staff as requested by school staff and directed by the Chief of Police or his/her designee;
- B. To the greatest degree possible, be present in areas of student congregation to observe activities, provide an authoritative presence, and promote informal student-SRO contact.
- C. Provide an educational program of leadership, training, and information about tobacco, alcohol, and other drugs, gangs, violence diffusion and prevention, and safety issues for students, staff members and parents;
- **D.** Refer students and their families to the appropriate agencies when a need is identified;
- E. Assist school staff in providing alcohol, drug, and other counseling; and in maintaining a peaceful campus environment;
- **F.** Gather, document in writing, and report to appropriate police department personnel information and intelligence pertaining to:
 - ongoing or potential criminal activity, gang activity, student unrest, and other problems affecting or likely to affect the school, students or faculty;
 - (2) students and other persons who are or may be disruptive to the school, the students or the learning environment; and
 - (3) monitor, investigate, and refer concerns of child welfare or status offenses such as truancy to the appropriate authorities pursuant to state law.

To the extent allowed by federal, state, and local laws, the SRO will report and provide information to school administrators concerning the above matters.

- G. Act as a communication liaison with law enforcement agencies, providing basic information concerning students (examples: truancy information, gang affiliation, threats of violence directed as the school or students);
- H. Take appropriate action, within departmental training, policies, regulations and general orders, in the event of on-campus or school-related criminal activity; and
- I. Perform such other or additional duties prescribed in the SRO assignment description attached hereto as Exhibit 1 and incorporated into this

agreement, as such description may be amended from time to time, and any general order further detailing the duties and responsibilities of the SRO.

It is understood and specifically agreed by the parties that the SRO shall not be a disciplinarian. It is agreed between the parties that the administration of student discipline, including student code of conduct violations and student misbehavior, is the responsibility of school administrators unless the violation or misbehavior involves criminal conduct. However, the SRO shall be a positive and visible presence of authority within the school and nothing herein shall be construed as requiring the SRO to ignore disruptive student behavior when so observed by the SRO.

7. Place of Duty.

- A. Except in case of illness or an absence authorized by the Police Chief, the SRO shall be present for duty except:
 - (1) When required elsewhere for follow-up investigation of criminal activity or student-related problems originating in or affecting the school to which such SRO is assigned or detailed;
 - When responding to school-related criminal activity occurring offcampus;
 - (3) When responding to emergency police activities, including but not limited to, a life-threatening off-campus incident and assistance during civil disorders or during other incidents where loss of life of bodily harm is foreseeable; provided, that emergency police activities shall not include assistance to another police officer during a routine off-campus traffic stop unless such stop is related to an on-campus incident; or
- B. The City shall endeavor to have the SRO present for duty each day that school is in session during the regular school year; provided, that the City shall not be required to furnish a substitute SRO on days when the regularly assigned SRO is absent due to (a) illness, (b) Police Department requirements including, but not limited to, mandatory in-service training sessions, staff meetings, response to subpoenas, or (c) other events approved in advance by the administrator of the assigned school and the Police Chief.

8. Financial Support for SRO Program.

- A. The District agrees to pay the City, as consideration for the assignment of one (1) School Resource Officer to work with the District as provided herein, an hourly sum of \$35.06. The SRO will submit a log of his District hours worked at the end of each semester.
- **B.** The City shall pay all costs incurred in connection with the SRO program, including but not limited to:
 - (1) Mandated in-service training;
 - (2) Vehicle, radio, uniform and equipment expenses;
 - (3) Overtime;
 - (4) Expenses related to or resulting from law enforcement related activities;

- (5) Benefits commensurate with City employment.
- C. One-half of the total due from the District to the City for each school year shall be paid at the start of each school semester of such year.
- 9. Effect on Previously Executed Agreements. Upon execution of this agreement, all previous agreements between the parties for assignment of a School Resource Officer to Lansing schools shall be void and of no further force or effect.
- 10. **Termination.** Either party may terminate this agreement upon 90 days prior written notice without cause. Payment due the City hereunder shall be prorated to termination date.
- 11. Governing Law. This agreement shall be governed by, construed, and enforced in accordance with the laws of the State of Kansas. In the event that the parties hereto are unable to resolve any controversy or claim arising out of, or relating to, this agreement or the making, performance, or interpretation of it without resort to the courts, the parties agree that exclusive jurisdiction and venue over such matter shall be in the District Court of Leavenworth, County, Kansas.
- 12. **Mutual Hold Harmless**. The District and City agree to protect, defend indemnify and hold each other, its officers, employees and agents free and harmless from and against any and all losses, penalties, damages, settlements, costs, charges, professional fees or other expenses or liabilities of every kind and character resulting from the error, omission or negligent act of the other party, its agents, or employees, in the performance of each party's duties under this Agreement. The District and City agree that a party shall not enter into any settlements which may fall within the provisions of this paragraph without the prior written consent of the other party.
- 13. **Headings.** The headings contained in this Agreement for are reference purposes only and shall not affect the meaning or interpretation of this Agreement.
- 14. Entire Agreement. This Agreement represents the entire agreement between the City and the District with respect to services required hereunder and supersedes any and all previous understandings, whether oral or written, between the City and the District regarding the same.
- 15. **Binding Effect.** This Agreement shall be binding upon and ensure to the benefit for the Parties hereto, their respective heirs, legal representatives, administrators, successors in interest, and assigns.
- 16. Assignment. No party to this Agreement shall assign any right or interest arising under this Agreement without the prior written consent of the other parties in this Agreement.
