The Regular Meeting Minutes for July 19, 2018, are enclosed for your review.

Action: Staff recommends a motion to approve the Regular Meeting Minutes for July 19, 2018, as presented.

Call To Order:

The regular meeting of the Lansing City Council was called to order by Mayor Mike Smith at 7:00 p.m.

Roll Call:

Mayor Mike Smith called the roll and indicated which Councilmembers were in attendance.

Councilmembers Present:

Ward 1: Dave Trinkle and Gene Kirby Ward 2: Andi Pawlowski and Don Studnicka Ward 3: Jesse Garvey and Kerry Brungardt

Ward 4: Tony McNeili

Councilmembers Absent: Gregg Buehler

OLD BUSINESS:

Approval of Minutes: Councilmember Brungardt moved to approve the special meeting minutes of June 28, 2018 and the regular meeting minutes of July 5, 2018, as presented. Councilmember Garvey seconded the motion. The motion was approved with Councilmember McNeill and Councilmember Kirby abstaining from the vote.

Audience Participation: Mayor Smith called for audience participation and a community member came forward. Bob Donaldson at 708 Bellerive Ct first apologized to City Administrator Tim Vandall for the comments that were directed towards him regarding the Fire District decision, because as the Council stated, he was just doing his job as directed. He thanked City Administrator Tim Vandall for providing the information he requested and also going the extra mile to offer to review it with him. He stated he is still trying to the figure out the 'why' of the situation that drove the City Council to pull out of the Fire District, even after reviewing the documents and video on the City website. Mr. Donaldson stated he would have liked to have seen this topic up for discussion outside of executive session and as a publicized topic. Mr. Donaldson addressed Councilmember McNeill about a rumor he heard that the decision to review the interlocal agreement and possible dissolution of the Fire District was predicated by votes upset with the mill levy.

Councilmember McNeill replied it was a conversation with Marcus Majure, as Mr. Majure was discussing the mill levy. He continued that part of his job on the Council is to hold the mill levy down, and after discussing with residents a flat mill levy, and taxes still go up residents call the City to complain even though the Fire District is a taxing entity the City doesn't control. He concluded by saying he explained to Mr. Majure that the Fire District can raise their mill levy and are not beholden to the electorate and the citizens who are not happy about that do not have someone to complain to so they complain to the Council, which is frustrating because it's not a City controlled entity.

Mr. Donaldson also stated he has not heard from someone who supports the decision and wants them to come forward and speak up. He also wished that a poll or vote would be taken, or other solutions can be put forward. He then asked if the taxes are going to go up in order to pay for equipment, even though the City gets about 66% of the assets from the Fire District.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall replied a lot of that is dependent on what the townships want to do.

 Mr. Donaldson stated he will be attending the meetings and staying for their entirety. He also stated he will be the Louis Klemp of the Council meetings and asking questions.
 - Mayor Smith stated that as City Administrator for 16 years discussions were brought up to the Fire Board
 throughout the years that they were going to price themselves out of the market and make the City look at
 what they were doing. He also stated it wasn't just Councilmember Pawlowski who has brought up the Fire
 District, but other Councilmembers and so the City formed a committee and the Council has made the
 decision.
 - Councilmember Garvey stated while people may not have spoken up at a meeting in favor of the dissolution of the Fire District, he's had many people express their approval of the decision.

Presentation: Recognition Plaque Presentation – Brian Schwanz: Mayor Smith and Community and Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz presented Brian Schwanz with a Recognition Plaque for his 12 years of service to the City on the Planning Commission. Brian Schwanz thanked the Council for the opportunity to service the citizens of Lansing.

COUNCIL CONSIDERATION OF AGENDA ITEMS:

Treasurer's Report for Quarter Ending June 30, 2018: Councilmember Studnicka moved to approve the treasurer's report for the Quarter ending June 30, 2018. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Design Services for 9 Mile Interceptor Sewer Extension:

- Councilmember Pawlowski stated I have a question.
 - o Councilmember McNeill replied we need a motion first.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated you can discuss.
 - Mayor Smith stated you can discuss it now before you go for a motion.
- Councilmember Pawlowski asked so we aren't going out for a bid for this just because GBA did the previous design.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied we're going to connect right to where they stopped, so we actually had all the data. It was a budget call two years ago whether we crossed East Mary or whether we don't, so they kind of have the inside scoop of what is going on there.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked you think they're cheaper than going to somebody else.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell stated I think they are the most qualified, and that is the most important thing when we're looking at a condensed time schedule to keep development moving forward.
- Councilmember Studnicka asked this is in addition to the 9d that we already designed to go out to Sherwood Forest and all that.
 - o Councilmember Pawlowski replied no.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied this would be a separate contract for just this section of pipes, separate from the Northwest Relief Sewer that they are currently designing in conjunction with PEC's design going across.
 - Councilmember Studnicka replied ok, thanks Tony.
- Councilmember Pawlowski responded wasn't this like a huge amount of money to do this piece because, this was a part that was identified to be done in the future but we were going to hopefully do the flow metering, which, of course, it hasn't rained so we can't tell.
 - o Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell replied when we did the Sewer Masterplan, several projects had been identified. In fact, about \$30 million dollars' worth of projects that were on the books. This was on the South side of Mary Street all the way to Main and Gillman was considered what they called Relief Sewer Phase 1. And that was something that didn't need to be done immediately like the 7 Mile Project or 9 Mile Project and it was more driven by when we have someone willing to develop, we're willing to put this in. So as things develop upstream from here, we will continue to add to this sewer section all the way down to completely encompass all the elements of the relief sewer project to Gillman Road.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked so wasn't there a part of this identified as being a particular choke point.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell stated just south of this location, yes.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated so why wouldn't we, I mean, I know it's more money but why wouldn't we go ahead and take care of that while we're doing this.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell responded it's the next segment south of there. It adds to scope creep, it adds to cost. It's not necessary at this time. We could if that is what the Council chooses to do. The problem we're running into in this particular case is the current manhole right there at the little green dot, on the South side of Mary Street, is very shallow compared to the new sewer interceptor. So if that development was going to connect, it would have an aerial crossing going across the creek which is not favorable. And then in order to accommodate any future flows, we'd have to make our new sewer the 36 inch pipe deeper which means we'd tear out the aerial crossing and then we'd have to go back across the creek again below the flow line. And it's really a duplication of work. So let's do it right the first time and sign the check.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski asked so there's no way to connect this new subdivision to this sewer without doing this.
 - Wastewater Utility Director Tony Zell responded you can connect it with an aerial crossing today, right now. That's not ideal because as the first 14 homes that get built, we're go to go. The 15th home, we got to go in and do this.

Councilmember Pawlowski moved to approve the scope and services from George Butler Associates for design engineer services for 9 Mile Interceptor Sewer Extension, City Project 18-04, in an amount not to exceed \$60,878. Councilmember Brungardt seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Agreement for DeSoto Road Inspection Services: Councilmember Kirby stated I just want to be clear Mike, because I think you said KDOT is not needed. It reads that it is needed.

- City Administrator Tim Vandall stated talking about the 3 way agreement.
 - o Councilmember Kirby stated you said it's not needed.
 - Mayor Smith stated oh yes, I recognize, you're right, you're right. Thanks Gene. Good catch
 - Councilmember Kirby stated it's a technicality.
- Councilmember Pawlowski stated it just sounds like a lot of money.
 - o City Administrator Tim Vandall stated it was the least.
 - Councilmember Pawlowski stated for a \$6 million dollar project.
 - City Administrator Tim Vandall stated you want quality on things like this but also this was the least out of the three we had spoken to.
- Councilmember Brungardt asked you guys are very pleased with them.
 - o City Administrator Tim Vandall stated they do a lot of work for us. They do our bridge inspections every year.
 - Public Works Director Jeff Rupp responded they've done this kind of work a number of other times and they are on the State's recommended list.
 - Councilmember Brungardt responded great.
- Councilmember McNeill asked this is for the entire plan, it's not just Phase 1, correct?
 - o Public Works Director Jeff Rupp responded no it's for both.
- Mayor Smith asked do we have a motion on this Sarah.
 - o City Clerk Sarah Bodensteiner replied we do.
- Mayor Smith stated ok. Anymore discussion?

Councilmember McNeill moved to approve the agreement for DeSoto Road Inspection Services with Alfred Benesch & Company in an amount of \$649,710 and to execute the 3-way agreement between the City of Lansing, Alfred Benesch & Company, and the State of Kansas Department of Transportation. Councilmember Brungardt seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Executive Session - Non-Elected Personnel: Councilmember Brungardt moved to recess into Executive Session to discuss an employee's performance pursuant to the non-elected personnel matter exception, K.S.A. 75-4319(b)(1) for 45 minutes beginning at 7:23 PM and returning to the Council Chambers at 8:08 PM. Councilmember Pawlowski seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Pawlowski moved to return to Open Session at 8:08 PM. Councilmember Kirby seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

Councilmember Kirby moved to authorize the Mayor to sign an amendment to the City Administrator's Contract based on results of the performance evaluation. Councilmember Garvey seconded the motion. The motion was unanimously approved.

REPORTS:

Department Heads: Community & Economic Development Director Matthew Schmitz stated there is some interest in changing the city website URL from lansing.ks.us to lansingks.org. A website ending in .gov would be \$400 a year, where .org is \$12 a year. A .gov domain is more difficult to acquire because it's handled through the federal government and has additional requirements. Matthew Schmitz stated staff and Council email addresses would change. The new email address and website address would be set as default and run simultaneously with the current email addresses and website address during the transition period for about 6 months to a year.

City Attorney: City Attorney had nothing to report

City Engineer: City Engineer had nothing to report

City Administrator: City Administrator Tim Vandall stated a citizen had contacted him and wants the City to participate in a rental registrations and inspections program. Councilmember Pawlowski stated neighboring towns are participating and it hasn't been a popular topic. Tim Vandall commented staff would need to be added to manage a program like that.

Governing Body: Councilmember Pawlowski stated she has been contacted in regards to the sprinkler system on Cottonwood being damaged.

City Administrator Tim Vandall responded it is on the homeowner if the sprinkler system was in the right of way and damaged.

Councilmember Pawlowski stated she had just been contacted about the trash being picked up on Friday instead of Saturday now.

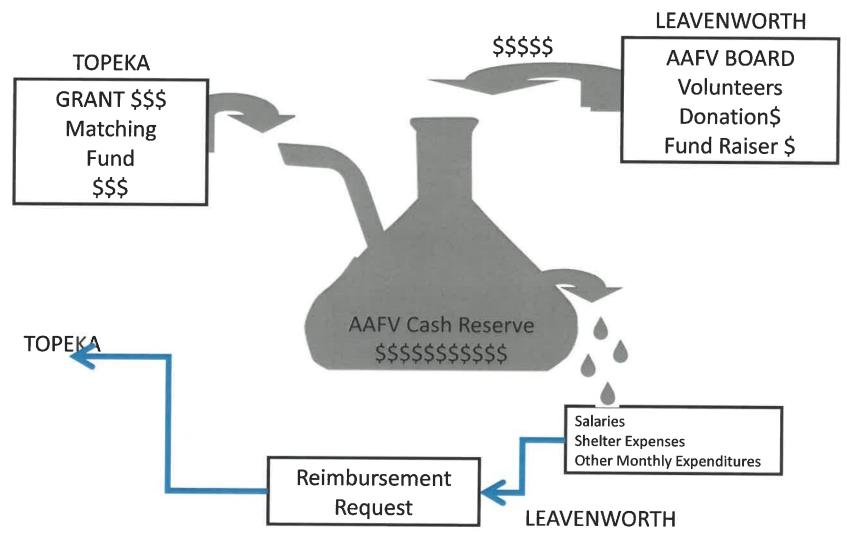
AAFV SERVICE INTERRUPTION RECAP NOVEMBER '17

Staff is pleased to present the Proposed 2019 Budget for the City of Lansing for consideration. The notice of public hearing summarizing the proposed 2019 budget was published in the *Leavenworth Times* on July 19, 2018.

The proposed 2019 Budget includes \$267,000 worth of *Capital and Supplemental Requests* as discussed at the June 28th and July 12th work sessions and summarized as follows:

General Fund:

- o City-wide phone system
- o Police record management system
- School Resource Officer
- o Municipal Court software upgrade

Police Equipment Reserve Fund:

- o 5 digital portable radios
- o Fingerprint scanner

The proposed 2019 budget reflects no increase to the mill levy.

Pursuant to Chapter 16, Utilities, Section 16-116 and 16-209 (e) of the City's Code of Ordinances, a copy of Ordinance No. 983 listing the account name, property address, and delinquent amounts for customers whose accounts are at least two (2) months past due is attached for your review. Upon adoption by the City Council and subsequent publication in the Leavenworth Times, this Ordinance shall constitute a lien against the real estate for which service is supplied.

Residents are given the opportunity to be removed from the Ordinance by setting up a payment plan with the city. Unfortunately, some residents default on their payment plan after the Ordinance has been published and submitted to the County for assessment against the property. Staff has informed each resident interested in setting up a payment plan that the account will be submitted to a third party collection agency if the resident misses a payment.

This Ordinance will be distributed in final form at the August 2, 2018 city council meeting to allow for receipt of payments through 5:00 p.m. on Thursday, August 2, 2018.

Action:

Staff recommends a motion to adopt Ordinance No. 1001 for assessment of delinquent sewer and trash bills.

ORDINANCE NO. 1001

AN ORDINANCE LEVYING ASSESSMENTS FOR UNPAID CHARGES AGAINST EACH LOT & PARCEL OF GROUND AS A SPECIAL ASSESSMENT TO CONSTITUTE A LIEN UPON THE PROPERTY FOR THE AMOUNT OF DELINQUENT FEES FOR SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL & SEWER ASSESSMENT OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS.

WHEREAS, section 16-116 and 16-209 (e) of the City of Lansing, Kansas, Code of Ordinances require the Finance Department to compile a list of all customers who are at least two (2) months delinquent on their solid waste Disposal and sewer services bills; and the Governing Body shall, by ordinance, levy and assess the charges and/or penalties against each lot or parcel of ground served as a special assessment.

WHEREAS, said Governing Body of the City of Lansing, Kansas, has determined that the cost for said services rendered be levied and assessed against each lot or parcel of ground for the unpaid charges as a special assessment, which shall constitute a lien upon the property for the amount of said delinquent fees.

WHEREAS, the assessment shall be collected at the same time and in the same manner as ordinary county ad valorem property taxes, subject to the same penalties and procedures provided for such taxes, and all laws applicable to the collection, levy and enforcement of county ad valorem property taxes.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF LANSING, KANSAS:

SECTION 1. Special assessments to pay the cost, including late fees and accrued interest, of the solid waste collection and waste water collection, and treatment, of the City of Lansing, Kansas, be and the same are hereby levied against the several lots, pieces, and parcels of land liable for such special assessments as a result of their failure to pay the unpaid charges as delinquent fees, as follows, such lands being in the City of Lansing, Leavenworth County, Kansas:
